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Cornelius Recreation Club Carries on Fine Activities

After a full year of activities for 1948, the Cornelius Recreation club is swinging into 1949 with plans for a Home Town Talent show at the Cornelius gymnasium on February 19. Mrs. Mary Harleman, who directed the club's very successful minstrel show last year, will be in charge of this affair. The club started its activities last year with Gene Hillis as president and a total of 145 members. First one their agenda was an outstanding minstrel show, which was presented three times in February and March. The proceeds put a total of \$280.20 in the treasury. In March the club decided to sponsor a group of Camp Fire girls and donated \$100 to the recent drive. Plans were made to purchase a movie projector in conjunction with the fire department and the school. A trophy was presented to the boys and girls basketball teams by the club. In April, the club decided to start work on a dirt tennis court and a fence. The city set aside \$116 for this work. A basketball game was held on May 1 for members and families to celebrate the first anniversary of the club. No meetings were held during the months of July and August.

Value of Red Cross Blood Program to All Stressed

Importance and value of the blood program sponsored by the American Red Cross was brought before the local Rotary club Thursday by Richard Codd, field representative of the Red Cross blood program. The recent war, it was pointed out, brought to the attention of the American people the great services performed by the blood banks. Codd stressed the point that as far as the Red Cross is concerned there will be no charge for the blood itself. The hospitals, he said, would make a charge, however, for administering the blood to the patient. This program is highly important in case of a national disaster or emergency, asserted Codd. It was pointed out that it would take about ten years to complete the program so that blood will be available to anyone needing it throughout the country regardless of race or creed. Although there was a large amount of plasma left over after the war, this will soon be used up in view of the increasing demand. However, Codd said, many cases in the past have been taken care of temporarily through walking blood banks, but often blood is needed immediately in emergencies and it is difficult to get certain types in an emergency, it was stressed. There are eight classifications of blood, either positive or negative. The program is being handled by the Red Cross because of the good blood plasma job done during the war and because of its being a community organization. It was stated, Ninety-two per cent of the chapters in the nation through a survey found that such a program was wanted and needed. It has now grown to a point where Portland is the seventeenth center, which will cover 16 counties including Washington county. It is a continuing program because there is no substitute for blood, declared Codd, who called for the co-operation of all in making blood available to all in need of it. Rev. Clifford N. Trout, county Red Cross chairman, introduced the speaker. He said the Red Cross was merely the implementing agency in the blood program. Orange Phelps was program chairman. J. W. Foytner will be in charge of the week's program and Howard Oldham will be Narrator reporter. Dr. Harold W. Bernard, one of Oregon's outstanding authorities in the field of mental hygiene, will be the speaker today.

Local Man Serving In Marine Division

CAMP PENDLETON, OCEANSIDE, CAL.—Marine Staff Sergeant Fred B. Corn, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Corn of Hillsboro is serving with the 17th marine regiment, an integral part of the first marine division. Assigned duties as an operations chief, Staff Sergeant Corn is under the direct command of Major General G. B. Erskine, U. S. Marine Corps, Commanding General of the first marine division. The 17th Marine Regiment is a component of the first marine division now stationed at the world's largest marine training center at Camp Pendleton, near Oceanside, Cal. Other units of the division are scattered from the shores of California to war-torn China, where they are engaged in the protection of American lives and property. During the early part of 1949, units of the first marine division will carry their standard into the Arctic wastes of Alaska for a period of intensive training in cold weather operations. A test of personnel and equipment, the operation is designed to conform with the mission of the marines—being trained for eventually in place of climate.

Rites Held for John M. Pitman

Harold Krammer of Cornelius has been selected to serve on the grand jury for the United States district court.

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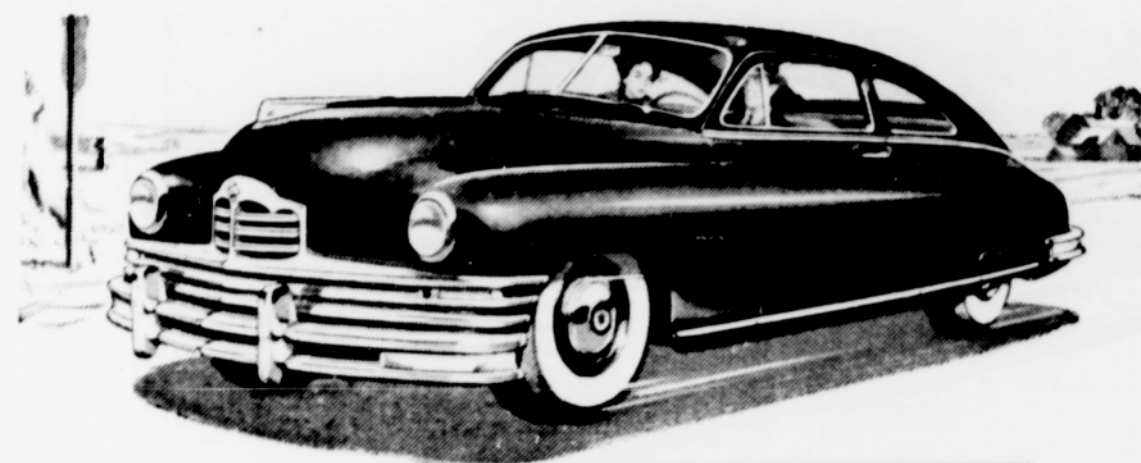
Farm Council Sub-Committees Elect Officers

Various sub-committees of the county Agricultural Advisory council which have been meeting this winter to consider various agricultural problems of the county have also elected officers for the next two years, reports Palmer S. Torvold, county agent. Committees which have met include the Farm Crops committee, which elected Glen Ritchey of Forest Grove as chairman and Richard Mueller of Cornelius as vice-chairman. The farm crops group discussed the overall crop situation for Oregon and Washington county. They stressed the importance of producing high quality seed crops, and pertinent information regarding forage crops, cereals, and seed control. They were particularly interested in Austrian winter field peas as a crop for Washington county, realizing that this crop may occasionally not provide comparable cash return with other crops but stressed its value in a rotation as a soil improving crop. Peas on a farm where there is livestock are also valuable for feed. They pointed out that local farmers could use Willamette velvet on the same basis and that it was a crop where the other areas of competition for seed and production are not as large or widely distributed as for Austrian peas. The group suggested that farmers planning to plant alfalfa include some perennial grass with it such as alfalfa, Tualatin outgrass, and English

ryegrass in order to prolong the life of the stand and to eliminate undesirable annual grass. Considerable discussion was held on fertilization for annual crops.

It was felt that for best use of fertilizer it should be applied just before planting of the crop in the fall. When this is not done and nitrogen is used, it should be applied during February or early March. Fifteen to 20 pounds of available nitrogen per acre was the recommended rate of application.
