Mental Health Big Problem, Rotarians Told

The national No. 1 health problem is mental health, asserted Dr. Harold L. Bernard, associate professor of education at Reed college, in speaking on mental hygiene at the Rotary club Thursday. He said our personal problems often are not nearly so serious as we imagine. To maintain mental health, Dr. Bernard made the following recommendations: (1) Keep in good physical health; (2) face facts as they are; (3) give attention to the present situation and don't bite off things in the future; (4) foster a sense of the ridiculous; (5) engage in satisfying work; (6) have religious devotion; (7) keep in good physical health, he advised eating good food leisurely, physical exercise, adequate rest and sleep, and some relaxation during the day.

Dr. Bernard held that people would live better and more rounded lives if they would observe the principles of good health.

One out of 20 persons will be in an institution for mental health during a lifetime, according to the speaker, who said 12 per cent of the 16,000,000 examined for military service during the last war were psychiatric problems. He pointed out that there are more beds for the mentally ill than for the physically ill.

J. L. Seay, new chairman of Hillsboro union high school board, at the luncheon this noon will present some of the problems facing the high school in housing, finance and instruction.

J. W. Poynter was program chairman and John Cox presented the speaker. Howard Oldham will be in charge of the program next week and Dr. R. E. Hutchison will be reporter.

Walter Grosjean reported on progress of the Rotary's part in the Bagley park playground and explained the contributors' roll of honor. He said that "Hank, the Sign Man," donated the boards.

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Appeasement Not Answer To Peace, Says Speaker

No appeasement answer to aggression, declared Judge Harold C. Kessinger of New Jersey, nationally famous orator and humorist, in speaking before the Washington County Knives and Fork club at a dinner meeting at Peter Boscow school cafeteria Friday night.

The speaker pointed out that we got rid of Hitler, but that we have another in the person of Stalin who is taking a bite at a time. He said the communists were waiting for the United States to have a depression.

History shows that on an average of nine years after every war we have a panic, according to Judge Kessinger, who said that in boom we go up too fast and then fall down. He held that history repeats itself because men and women make the same mistakes over and over again.

People that lose any one of their political, economic and religious freedoms as enjoyed in this country are in danger of losing all, asserted the speaker, who declared that there is no place in the world for as many have as much as in the United States.

Judge Kessinger asked if we are so politically immature that we do

not know how to use our inventions and development for the good of mankind. He said that we have made the atomic bomb and wondered as to what we were going to do with it and what it is going to do to us. It was pointed out that gunpowder destroyed feudalism and that the airplane ended isolationism.

The need for a foreign policy for this nation that the whole world knows was stressed by the speaker, who said that if aggressors know exactly where we stand it might help to prevent war.

Too many officeholders, the speaker maintained, have been thinking only of the next election and not of the next generation.

Judge Kessinger said that we should not fear Russia because she is strong, but rather because she is weak with an economic system that does not work and with millions of its people discontented. Faced with trouble at home, a nation may start aggression.

No iron curtain is thick enough, the speaker held, to keep out forever the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of Man.

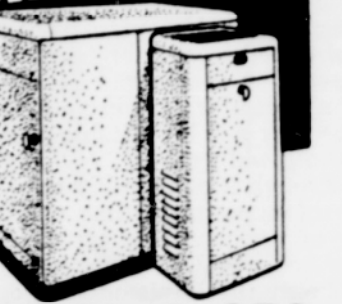


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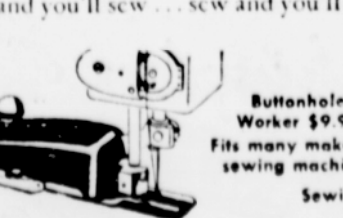


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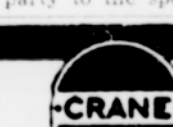


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
