Barney Sees Need For Special Levy

equipment of the city force as soon as finances permit. Barney sees no need for a special levy for the 1948-49 fiscal year.

The total cost of operating the department during 1948 was \$18,254.94 and revenue derived from the efforts of the department was \$11,531.

Arrests made totaled 962, circumscribed 1,803 in 1948. Revenue from the 207 parking meters operated during the year totaled \$14,293.31 or \$5.75 per meter per month.

Fire Department—Five trucks, three firemen, including the chief and between 20 and 35 volunteer firemen composed the department during the year. The department answered 71 calls during the year within the city and 35 in rural areas. Trucks traveled 974 miles during the year and 23,600 feet of hose were put down. Fire losses within the city amounted to \$89,389.18 during the year. Of that figure, \$85,867 was represented by the fire at the Tualatin Valley Co-op elevator. Construction of the new fire station was started in July and should be ready for occupancy this month, Barney reported. The \$85,000 bond issue was not enough to complete the building and part of the second floor is being left unfinished. Financing of the remaining work should be arranged during the year, the city manager recommended.

Water System—The new 18-inch steel water transmission line and intake structures were completed and put into operation September 20, 1948, thereby insuring an adequate future water supply. Barney reported. A water right on Scoggins Creek was relinquished during the year because development seemed uncommercial. Existing water mains in the distribution system total 24,214 miles and there are 28,243.5 miles of transmission mains. The water system is entirely self-supporting and all outstanding bonds are being retired yearly. The gross operating earnings of the system during 1948 amounted to \$110,785.03 as compared to \$101,404.37 for 1947 and \$44,672.75 in March 1940 when the system was purchased by the city.

Building—Building permits issued by the city hit a record figure during the past year. Permits amounting to \$1,092,972 were issued in 1948 as compared to \$1,055,991 in 1947 and \$697,261 in 1946.

Public Parks—Because of a reduced budget, very little but general maintenance has been done in this department during the year. Barney reported. A substantial portion should be included in the next budget for improvement of parks, the city manager recommended. Park revenues decreased from \$410.85 in 1947 to \$270.66 in 1948. Development of Bailey park was begun during the year with the help of \$814.79 from the McQuillan estate and contributions from local service clubs and individuals. Further development of the area is expected.

Airport—Receipts from the airport dropped to \$424.27 during 1948 from \$690.29 during the previous year. The decrease, Barney pointed out, is offset by the accumulating equity of the city in the hangars as provided for under the lease agreements. A total of \$6687.77 was spent during the year for maintenance and betterment. One of the major needs of the field, Barney stated, is a water line served by the Hillsboro water system to afford safe drinking water and also to provide adequate fire protection.

Sewer System—Only 288.5 feet of eight-inch sewer line was constructed during 1948. New service connections totaled 63 of which 52 were residential. The total of active sewer connections now is 1507. Barney reported. A complete survey of the sanitary waste disposal system was recommended by Barney since both sewer mains and the domestic disposal plant are over-

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loaded. Until such time as the present disposal plant can be enlarged sufficiently to treat properly all domestic waste, all plant effluent should be chlorinated during the low water seasons, Barney stated. The city manager's report called attention to the heavy infiltration of storm water into sanitary sewer lines, attributing much of it to improper street drainage. During the rainy season, water accumulates in ditches along the roadway and then filters into the sanitary sewers, Barney pointed out, thus overloading the lines. Barney stated he has believed that an aggressive street improvement program is more reasonable answer to the problem than construction of additional sanitary sewer lines and building a disposal plant much larger than is necessary for the normal sanitary sewage flow. Treatment of the industrial waste by the irrigation method has proven quite successful and much more economical than any other type of treatment. The disposal farm earned sufficient revenue to carry the operation less the capital investment of \$367,292. The cost of the operation, reduced by reduction of adequate irrigation pipe and sprinkling equipment, reducing the cost of moving pipe and sprinklers to a minimum, Barney stated in the report.

Street Department—An extensive street improvement program was continued through 1948 with all new work being paid for by property owners. A total of \$131,680.25 was spent on street and sidewalk construction during the year, all of which was paid for by property owners except \$4006.16 paid by the city in the widening of South First avenue between Main and Baseline streets and \$17,134.26 on street maintenance. In the past few years the actual maintenance of city streets has been somewhat neglected, the report stated, because too much of the revenue has been used for widening and resurfacing existing streets. "I feel that this practice should be avoided and that street widening and resurfacing should be done by a special levy for such purpose," Barney said, "providing of course that such a levy would be above the six per cent limitation and would require a vote of the people. I believe that if the voters were aware of the necessity, a special levy for a specific project would be carried, especially when it is shown that present investments might be jeopardized unless sufficient maintenance funds are provided."
