

Soldier's Rites Set Wednesday

Last rites for Sgt. Charles L. Shaper, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. D. Walker, route 3, Beaverton, will be held Wednesday afternoon at Lincoln Memorial Park cemetery, Portland, with Young's Funeral home in charge of arrangements. Rev. Steen Whitehead will officiate.

Sgt. Shaper died February 13, 1944, in Luzon of pneumonia after an illness of only three days. He had been in combat until struck down by illness. He entered the service October 17, 1941, and had served in the Hawaiian Islands, New Guinea, Guadalcanal, New Britain and Luzon. He was awarded an army proficiency certificate for his commendable active interest in his duties as chief wire man in the 40th division. A member of the field artillery, Sgt. Shaper had been overseas three years.

Born in Little Falls, N. Y., January 11, 1917, he moved with his parents to Phoenix, Arizona, where he completed grade school and moved to Portland in 1930, where he attended Washington high school. The family later moved to a farm near Beaverton and he was graduated from Beaverton high school in 1934.

Besides his mother and step-father, he is survived by a sister, Mrs. Glen Hill, of Hillsboro, and a brother, Harold, route 3, Beaverton.
