

Sunset Chamber Speaker Heard

A democratic government is a regulatory system wherein the civil agent or representative of the people by extending and protecting the natural and basic laws making them applicable to our ever-changing society, stated Roy Vanderzanden, president of the Sunset chamber of commerce, in a talk before the Hillsboro chamber Tuesday. Members of the Hillsboro chamber were honored guests at the meeting.

The title of Vanderzanden's address was "Wake Up America." He who will not reason is a bigot, Vanderzanden said. "He who cannot reason is a fool and he who does not is a slave."

A challenge is before us now to strengthen the sinews that will build democracy safely through the "bitter roads" that lie ahead, Vanderzanden said.

A person can have freedom only so long as he fulfills his obligations to his fellowmen, the speaker continued. He pointed to the need for citizen responsibility in connection with the ballot. The voter must be informed, he stated.

Sunset chamber members who attended with Vanderzanden included Bob Schlegel, Bob Chapin, Spud Moore, and Lockwood.

Power Shortage Reported Eased

Milder weather conditions and longer daylight hours have combined to relieve the Pacific Northwest power situation to the point where normal use of electricity can be resumed except during a short-circuited evening peak period of one hour between 4 and 6 p. m. Portland General Electric company officials have announced.

PG&E spokesmen expressed appreciation of the public cooperation which they said had been responsible for avoiding a general breakdown of electric service during recent critical weeks.

Their appraisal of the relieved power situation was qualified, however, with the caution that the margin between generator capacity and present power load remains narrow. Sudden cold weather could quickly create a new crisis, they said, and advised the public to avoid wasting electricity and to be alert for notice of any new critical development.

Portland General Electric company offices switched back to normal office hours from 8:30 a. m. to 5:30 p. m. on Wednesday of this week.

He said the Republican party is doing the work at Salem while a group is opposing the divide and conquer strategy. They're trying to give the current version of state law, the same black eye that has been given the last Congress, he pointed out.
