Hillsboro Hospital Earns High Ranking

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of the present site.

Manager Sam Coy asserts that as much local labor and materials were used in construction of the hospital as was possible. Working on the hospital had more than the usual significance for several of the men employed. Coy reports: Nine or 10 of the workers' wives were in the hospital since its completion.

The older wing of the hospital is now used exclusively for maternity cases and the nursery was enlarged in January of this year. Also included are two labor and delivery rooms.

Contained in the new wing are two major and one minor surgical suites.

The hospital's self-sufficiency is illustrated by the diversity of activity which goes on within its walls. A complete laundry is utilized in sparkling white condition. Also available is a sewing room for repair work on hospital fabric.

Twenty thousand quarts of fruit are canned in the hospital each year and a freezing unit also is used to preserve foodstuffs.

Four hundred and 23 babies were born at Jones hospital last year with no baby deaths reported. Four, however, were stillborn.

In 1947, 1779 patients were admitted. That figure rose to 2325 in 1948. During the year just past, patient-days amounted to 16,654.

If an inscription were to be put over the main entrance of Jones hospital, it might well read: "A private enterprise doing a community service."

Bill Would Affect Seasonal Workers

A bill that affects thousands of AFL canner workers has been introduced in the legislature by Representative Phil Brady, president of the Portland Central Labor Council and president of the joint Council of Teamsters, according to Bob Melquist, secretary of Teamster Cannery local 634.

The bill, HB 142, would repeal the section of the unemployment compensation law which now grants exemptions to employers of seasonal workers.

Truman Asks Wider Social Security

President Truman sent to congress Monday legislation to expand social security to include 20 million more persons, provide federal aid for the needy and disability insurance.

Two administration bills also call for loans in social security payments by both employers and employees. They would hike the taxes

of persons already participating from one to one and one-half per cent until January 1, 1951 at which time it would go up to two per cent. New categories brought under coverage would be taxed two per cent effective January 1, 1950.

Cain Charges Wallgren With Red Associations

Senator Harry P. Cain (R-Wash.) has charged that former Gov. Mon C. Wallgren of Washington, named by President Truman to head the National Security Resources Board, is guilty of association with Communists.

Cain made charges before the senate armed services committee and also accused Cain of shady dealings concerning the selling and purchase of a state yacht, the value of shares and interest payment of the Longview bridge and the issue

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price of state liquor licenses. Cain has been favoring out an active campaign to block the presidential appointment of Wallgren to the Security Resources board.

Portland Papers Down Due to Pressmen Strike

Pressmen on the Oregonian and Journal in Portland walked out of the plants Friday and neither of the papers has been published since the strike.

The issue involves wages and working conditions. Picket lines were placed around the two papers Tuesday and the AFL-Central Labor council has placed the two newspapers on the "unfair" list.

Federal conciliators renewed attempts on Wednesday to meet with union leaders in the Portland newspaper pressmen's strike with no results.
