

Conditions in Business Noted By Christensen

William C. Christensen, president of the Commercial National bank returned last week from a meeting in Kansas City, Mo., of the agricultural commission of the American Bankers Association of which he is a member. Mr. and Mrs. Christensen drove to Santa Barbara, Calif., where they stayed with their son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Christensen, while he took the train to Kansas City.

"Business conditions are the same throughout parts of the United States that I visited," Christensen said. "Conditions are no more worse here in Oregon than they are in California or in the middle west. Unemployment now aggregates approximately 3,500,000, somewhat due to unusual weather conditions throughout the country. This is not an alarming figure when

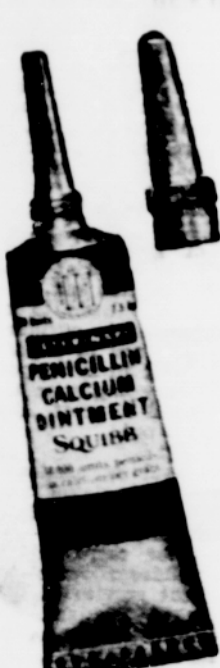
we consider that unemployment amounted to eight million before the war and millions of married women have since entered the labor army.

"At the present time we are witnessing a recession in business, one which has long been anticipated and which is, moreover, a natural postwar correction. What has happened is that shortages which existed no longer are apparent. Jean Q. Public now finds he can buy a white shirt, furniture, and most other commodities except steel and a few makes of motor cars. In other words our economy has gone from a seller's to a buyer's market.

"Apparently the cash income for agriculture will be substantially less for the farmers in 1949 than in 1948. Good crops are anticipated throughout the United States and with the heavy surpluses being carried over farm commodity prices are bound to suffer. It is not for the present support of farm commodities prices would suffer disastrously."
