Rites Saturday For War Hero

Funeral services for PFC Erling Hixon Kommer, who was killed in action on Okinawa May 21, 1945, while serving with the 97th division, will be held at the Forest Grove Lutheran church chapel at 2 p.m. Saturday under the auspices of the Banks American Legion post. Interment will be in its cemetery.

The young infantryman entered the service June 28, 1944, and went overseas in December. He was killed just four days before his 20th birthday.

Born in Hittlerdal, Minn., May 25, 1925, he came to Oregon with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Kommer, in 1936. After spending a year at Oregon City, the family moved to Buxton. He was a graduate of Buxton high school and attended Banks union high school. He was employed at the Shields Logging company at the time of his injury.

In addition to his parents, he is survived by a sister, Yvonne, of Buxton and brothers, Curwood and Leaborn.

Solons Nearing End of Session

The state senate passed the old-age pension act Tuesday, 19 to 11, checking another major matter off the calendar as the tiring legislators hoped to end the session by today.

The pension bill passed at the November election and held unworkable by the attorney general. It promised a \$500 pension to those who were 65 and over and had sufficient money and means. Members of the ways and means committee think there will be the bill. It was claimed that the state public welfare commission will have a prior claim on estates of pensioners when they die to recover assistance given them while they were alive.

All of the ways and means appropriation measures are expected to be cleared from the committee by today.

The house passed a senate-approved bill which would let cities vote to bond themselves to provide off-street parking facilities. Governor Douglas McKay Tuesday signed the daylight savings bill, which would knock out Portland's daylight saving ordinance. It would let the governor choose daylight saving time on a state-wide basis only when necessary because adjoining states had adopted it.

Earthquake Rocks Hillsboro Area

stated that large oak trees along the highway east of Cornelius were being tossed around.

Running E. H.
A Pacific university student, Hans Running, was in the optometry department at the college having his glasses checked. Various lenses were being tested at the time of the shock. He began weaving back and forth in the chair, then said: "Listen, you guys, I'm sick" and sat down on the floor.

A woman who was arriving from Portland on a bus just as the quake hit, gained momentum, said that she had no idea that trees were being felt. She stepped off the bus in Hillsboro and started into a store, only to have a person tell her: "Don't go in there! We're having an earthquake!"

The earthquake which rocked Hillsboro was felt as far north as Vancouver, B. C., and seemed to center in the Tacoma area.

In Portland, where the weather bureau reported that the quake lasted for 60 seconds, office workers streamed to the street when the first shock was felt. The area around Olds & King department store was roped off after an outer wall cracked.

Persons sitting at their desks on the 12th floor of the new Equitable building were knocked to the floor. Round pillars and corners in the Oregon Journal's office were cracked.

The seismograph at the University of Washington recorded tremors from 11:55 a.m. until 12:44 p.m. In Olympia, Wash., near the center of the disturbance, two persons were killed by falling bricks from the Olympia hotel.

Walls of the county courthouse at Tillamook were reported cracked. Hillsboro Fire Chief Wilbur Dillon joined the Portland fire department in giving a warning to householders to inspect their chimneys carefully before starting fires in stoves or furnaces. If cracks were caused by the earthquake, fire danger is present, Dillon warned.

No estimate of damage was immediately available but cost of the quake is expected to run into millions of dollars.

The Tacoma youth was killed when a corner of his grade school building fell on him as he left to go on traffic patrol.

Bisson died after being struck by a falling chimney in Olympia.

Mr. West died after a heart attack brought on by the quake.

Kurvie was riding a bicycle when a wall collapsed, killing him and his dog.

The quake was described as the worst in Pacific northwest history. The seismograph at the University of Washington, after first having its needle knocked off by the force of the quake, finally gave up a reading of 7. A reading of 10 is the top figure on the seismograph.
