Miss Margaret Perry presented a film produced by the National Education association concerning the federal aid bill now before congress which authorizes \$95,000,000 annually to help states pay the cost of their public elementary and secondary schools. The film shows that the difficulty of our public schools are increasing. The total result is one in which millions of children are receiving either no schooling or educational opportunities which are seriously below acceptable standards.

In presenting the film, Miss Perry pointed out that under the proposed bill state control of education is guaranteed in two ways. First, no educational controls now exercised by the states are transferred to the federal government; second, the bill explicitly prohibits a federal agency of office from exercising any educational control over any public school or public school system sharing the benefits of the act.
