

Speaker Stresses Importance of Amateur Spirit

There is no defeat in life for the man who plays for the sake of the game rather than striving for mere fleeting ideals as power, fame and wealth, Dr. Harry Means, Chairman of Hood River told Hillsboro Lions and Rotarians at their joint meeting in the chamber of commerce rooms Wednesday night.

We can be happy just mingling and working with other people, he said. Speaking on the subject, "The Amateur Spirit," Dr. Means brought many laughs along with emphasizing the importance of the citizenry finding a formula for happiness measured in cooperation rather than greed.

He pointed out that Hitler once achieved power and it didn't last. "I can't believe Russia's tyrant will last," he commented. "No man or nation will ever control the world."

The speaker said "America is young, vigorous and promising, and went on to say he knows of no country in the world which compares with it.

Dr. Means said this country has never had so many businessmen willing to give of time and money for public benefit. This despite statistics which show that a large majority of our businessmen at some time during their careers have had failures.

The speaker pointed to a three-point William Allen White philosophy for getting the most pleasure out of a dollar. Enjoy earning, enjoy having it, and then enjoy giving it, he said.

Mervin Brink, program chairman, introduced the speaker. President Lloyd Rump welcomed the Rotarians on behalf of the Lions, who were hosts. Rotary President Leo Pearson responded.

All of the blood, donated by volunteers, is supplied without charge to doctors and hospitals for their patients. The blood collected by the mobile unit goes back to hospitals in the counties where it was donated.

The mobile unit will be in Beaverton Friday.

In each of the co-operating counties, the county medical society is co-sponsor of the program with the Red Cross.

Blaze Destroys Sanche Residence

Fire destroyed the Henry Sanche residence two miles east on route 4, Hillsboro, Tuesday morning, according to Winan W. Winans, fire chief. Mrs. Sanche suffered third degree burns about the face and arms in the blaze. Dillon reported.

The home and all its contents were destroyed but Hillsboro firemen saved the garage and a car. The fire is believed to have started behind a refrigerator, the fire chief said.

Loss on the home was estimated at approximately \$4500 with contents valued at about \$2000. Also lost in the blaze was \$100 in cash. The home was partially covered by insurance.

The department answered a call Tuesday afternoon to the Ray Dean residence at 376 E. Jackson, Dillon. Fire had started on the roof from the chimney but the damage was very slight, he said.

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New Bridge Due Over Gales Creek

A new, wider bridge across Gales Creek will soon greet motorists traveling between Forest Grove and McMinnville.

Construction of the concrete structure to replace the narrow wooden span is now underway. The new bridge will be 35 feet wide with a 26-foot roadway. The old roadway is 17 feet wide. Additional width is allowed for sidewalks along the new bridge. The new span will be 95 feet long.

The job is being done for the state highway department by Snook Bros. of Corvallis. Bert Palmer, foreman, said, traffic should be moving over the new bridge before the end of May. The highway is not closed.
