

Police Announce Report for April

Fines amounting to \$1,411 entered the city coffers from fines during the month of April, according to Melvin DeRock, city police chief. Violations of road and driving laws resulted in 122 warnings, 101 arrests and fines of \$807.50, the chief said.

Four arrests were made for intoxication with fines amounting to \$60. Five hundred warnings were issued for parking violations with \$144 collected in fines. One arrest was made for driving while intoxicated and a \$100 fine was imposed. Delinquent tickets netted \$29.50.

Four youngsters were turned over to the juvenile court for breaking and entering and larceny from an auto. Two larceny and one mental case were turned over to the circuit court by local officers and two drivers without licenses were sent into justice court during the month, DeRock said.

Three felony cases were reported and one was cleared. Three bicycle thefts were reported, two of them being recovered, the chief declared.

City Budget Needs Call for Election

\$2000. Estimated receipts of \$96,913.44 are divided as follows: General fund, \$63,329; street fund, \$19,735.59; and sinking funds (debt service) \$13,851.25. Of the \$37,338.50 to be raised by taxation \$26,706 is subject to the six per cent limitation and \$10,632.50 is for debt service. This plus the \$11,000 to be submitted outside the tax limitation makes a total tax of \$48,338.50.

In submitting the estimated budget figures City Manager J. W. Barney called attention to some specific conditions particularly pertaining to anticipated receipts. Under the item fees and licenses, the estimated receipt of \$4000 is based upon an anticipated 30 per cent increase in the city occupation of business license, while the utility franchises are based upon the anticipated franchise fee of \$100 per year from the Portland Gas & Coke company and \$4500 per year from the Portland General Electric company, Barney said. He pointed out that the latter amount is subject to the issuance and renewal of the franchise by the city during 1949 and the estimate of \$4500 was furnished by the electric company as the amount they would be able to pay for the franchise.

"Under the item liquor revenue," Barney said, "this shows a small increase over last year based upon change made in the liquor revenue appropriation by the last legislature and is only an estimate."

Install More Meters
"Under the item parking meter receipts, the estimate for this item is based upon the addition of 75 new meter installations as ordered by the council."

"The item property sale, is based upon the selling of the city-owned property lying immediately south of the city hall and which is not being used by the city and has been ordered sold by the council."
"The item of state gas tax appropriation has been increased approximately \$2300 over the last year's appropriation, the increase being estimated from the legislative action increasing the state gas tax, motor vehicle license fees, etc."

Letters have gone out to business firms relative to the possible increase of 30 per cent in the occupation tax to pay for an automatic street pick-up broom at a cost of \$8500 in order that the streets.

both in the business zone and residential area, might be kept in better condition.
General fund expenditures are estimated at \$98,000 plus \$2000 for estimated delinquent taxes, leaving the total budget subject to the six per cent limitation of \$96,000.
Street fund expenditure estimates are \$12,355.59, estimated receipts less cash overdraft of the same amount leaving no proposed tax levy.

Increases Noted
Under the general fund expenditure estimates, a deputy recorder is provided, which brings the total for this department up from \$3605 to \$4005. City hall expense is up from \$2665 to \$3150; insurance from \$1370 to \$1650; police department from \$17,510 to \$21,620; fire department from \$12,240 to \$13,250; library from \$3500 to \$4000; storm sewers \$4000; fire station improvement \$2000; emergency \$2500; street improvements on city-owned property \$1525.

Estimated receipts were given as follows: Occupation taxes from \$2800 to \$4000; utility franchise from \$3300 to \$4500; permits from \$1000 to \$1200; fines and forfeitures from \$5500 to \$10,000; dog redemptions \$30; rural fire runs from \$2500 to \$3700; liquor revenue from \$2500 to \$2500; bicycle licenses \$75; auditorium income down from \$1500 to \$1200; Fourth of July celebration \$1000; airport rentals \$2760; parking meter receipts from \$1400 to \$1800; miscellaneous \$200; city hall county land sale \$15; and property sale \$6500.

Under street fund expenditures city engineer expense is estimated at \$1600; street cleaning is upped from \$2400 to \$3500; traffic up from \$1000 to \$1615; street maintenance up from \$8166.51 to \$10,070.39; miscellaneous \$950. Receipts are estimated as follows: State gas tax appropriation up from \$16,000 to \$19,000; county road tax appropriation down from \$3300 to \$1500; and miscellaneous \$1000.

Debt Service Payments
In general fund bond issues \$12,000 remains outstanding on the 1942 airport issue with \$4000 provided for retirement and \$210 in interest. Fire hall general fund bond issue of \$85,000 calls for a \$9000 retirement and \$2273.75 in interest and a sinking fund appropriation for fire hall bond retirement of \$9000.

Sewer and water bonds are being retired from the revenues of the systems. The refunding sewer issue of 1938, \$85,000 outstanding will have \$3000 retired and 1941 issue of \$11,000 outstanding will be reduced \$1000.

In water system issues the 1940 purchase with \$116,000 outstanding will be reduced \$8000, series 1946 with \$600,000 outstanding will be cut \$25,000 and nothing on series 1947 of \$160,000.

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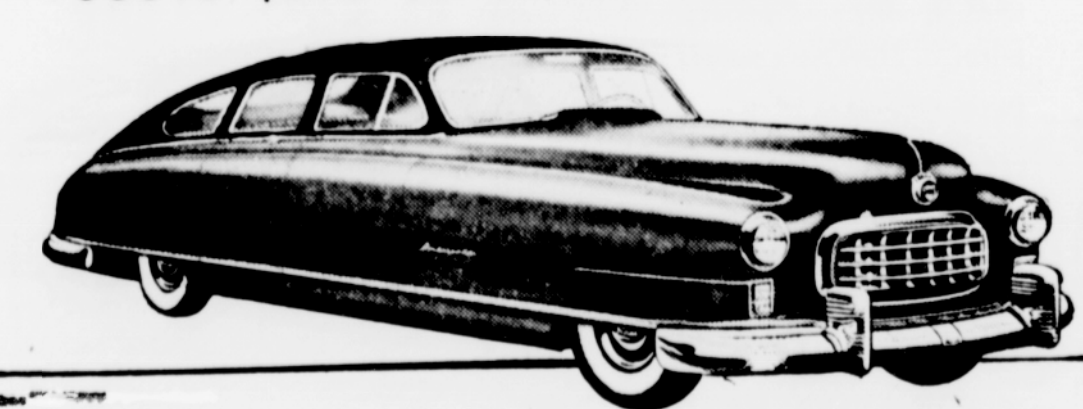
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
