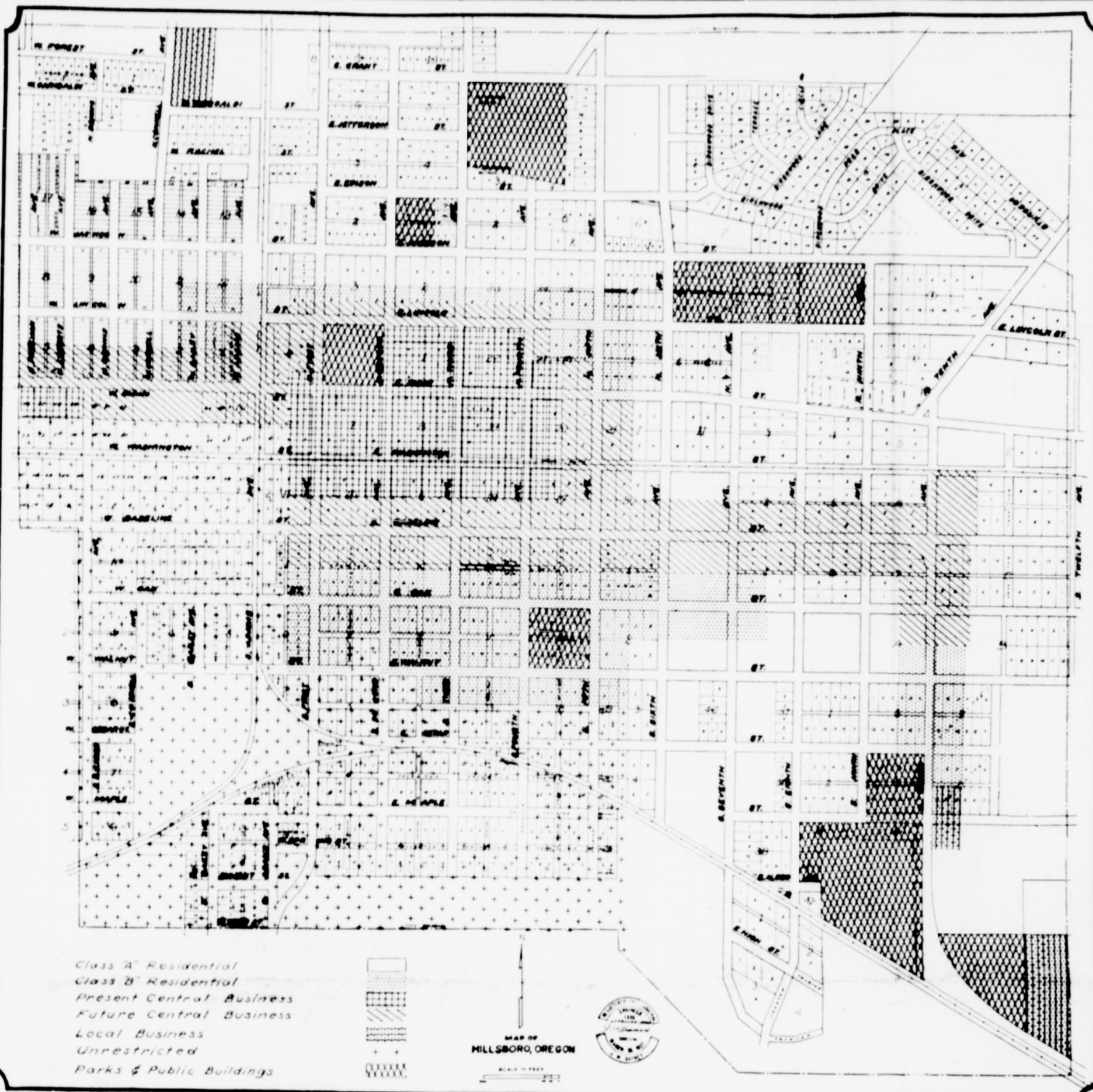

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EXPANSION OF THE HILLSBORO BUSINESS AREA, recommended to the city council by the planning commission, will be aired Monday night at a public hearing scheduled for the city hall. The present business district and the proposed new limits are shown in the above diagram. The proposal would make 10 blocks along

Baseline street a part of the business zone. In recommending the change, the planning commission stated that inclusion of the new area in the business district would fill the city's needs in this respect for 10-20 years to come.

Better Understanding Held Need in Labor Relations

The deepest need of all of us is to feel that we are needed, declared Whiting Williams of Cleveland, O., in speaking on "What's on the Worker's Mind" before the Washington County Knife and Fork club at the Peter Boscow cafeteria Thursday night.

To get the answer to this basic question, Williams quit his position as vice-president and personnel director of the Cleveland Hydraulic Steel company after the first World War to talk to workers in many countries in their language and as one worker to another. He has worked in factories, shops and mines in this country, mined coal in Wales and Belgium, seeking work and living as a laborer in England and Scotland, mined coal in northern France and later in Germany during the French occupation and the great inflation, hobnobbed with an interpreter with workers in Germany, Italy, Russia and centers of radical and jobless workers in America.

Need Better Understanding

Necessity for a better understanding of what is on the worker's mind, was cited by the speaker, who said that besides his paycheck the worker wants job security, hope for promotion, belief in himself and recognition from others. His greatest fear is in not having a job, he asserted.

The whole question depends on simple things, according to Williams, who offered the following advice to employers: (1) Reduce fear of unemployment; (2) Justify hope for promotion on merit; (3) Rebuild pride of job, company and industry; (4) Greater use of every human contacts at all levels; (5) Use of a great deal more explanation; and (6) Greater use of commendation when deserved.

The real reason for the great development and business strides that have given this country the highest standard of living in the world, it was held, that we stimulated the maximum use of our blessings, the high degree of morality in business, and the great amount of gambling on ourselves in the way of preparation for betterment.

Battle of Hope vs. Fear

The cold war between east and west represents a battle of national mainstays, according to Williams, who pointed out that this main-spring in the United States is hope and respect for the individual, while in Russia it is fear based on the secret police and the propaganda pumped into them that they are in danger of attack from capitalist nations. He said that if the Kremlin told the Russia people that they were to have peace the whole thing would blow up because of the oppression that exists through fear.

The danger here in America, according to Williams, is that the main-spring of hope may be lost.

having come close to it in the depression. He said there is a new contest here between the political distributor of wealth and the agricultural and industrial distributor of wealth. The tendency, it was pointed out, is to place the honor system in the politician who promises the most for the least and if that wins out we lose our America through the destruction of opportunity and hope through big government and big labor. The possible setting of class against class would be fatal to all that we hold dear, declared the speaker. Abundance of jobs is the greatest thing for all, according to Williams, who said that the government must encourage freedom and fairness of opportunity to all along with teamwork.

Hope was expressed by the speaker that Oregon's Senator Morse, Ohio's Senator Taft and New York's Senator Ives may be able to work out compromise labor legislation that will be fair to labor, management and the public. He pointed out that the Taft-Hartley law gives more protection to the individual union member, but curbs the activities of union leaders.

This was the last meeting of the season and President Frank Broderick of Forest Grove urged all members to turn in their dues as soon as possible so that arrangements could be made for next fall. He named a nominating committee

Hearing Set for Monday On Re-Zoning Plan Here

A public hearing is scheduled for Monday at 8 p.m. in the city hall on expansion of the central business zone, recommended recently to the city council by the planning commission. Also included in the planning commission's report were recommendations for repeal of the 17-foot setback regulation on Baseline street and inclusion of the entire business district.

Recommended for inclusion in the business zone were the following areas:

North side of Lincoln street for one-quarter of a block from mid-way between the railroad and First to include the southwest quarter of the block at Fifth avenue.

One-half block on each side of West Main street from halfway in the block between First and the railroad to North Freeman avenue.

The north half of the block between Main and Lincoln on Fourth one-quarter of the block deep.

The east half of the block on Main between Fourth and Fifth on the north side, a half block deep.

The east half of the block bounded by Main, Fifth, Washington and Fourth.

The west half of the block bounded by Main, Sixth, Washington and Fifth.

The northeast quarter of the block bounded by Washington, Fifth, Baseline and Fourth.

The northwest quarter of the block bounded by Washington, Sixth, Baseline and Fifth.

One-half block on either side of Baseline from halfway between the railroad and First to halfway between Tenth and Eleventh.

The northwest quarter of the block on Washington between Tenth and Eleventh.

One-half block on each side of Tenth and Oak.

Location "Scramble" After observing the "scramble"

where business can expect a successful location.

Business cannot logically be expected to move north because of the many existing non-commercial buildings and expensive residential properties in that direction, it was pointed out. The westward move of business would be hampered because of the heavy industry already existing west of First avenue.

Movement to the east would be hampered because of existing property values, it was stated, but some eastward expansion is recommended by the commission.

"Business could expand to the south utilizing both sides of Baseline street and could then extend eastward."

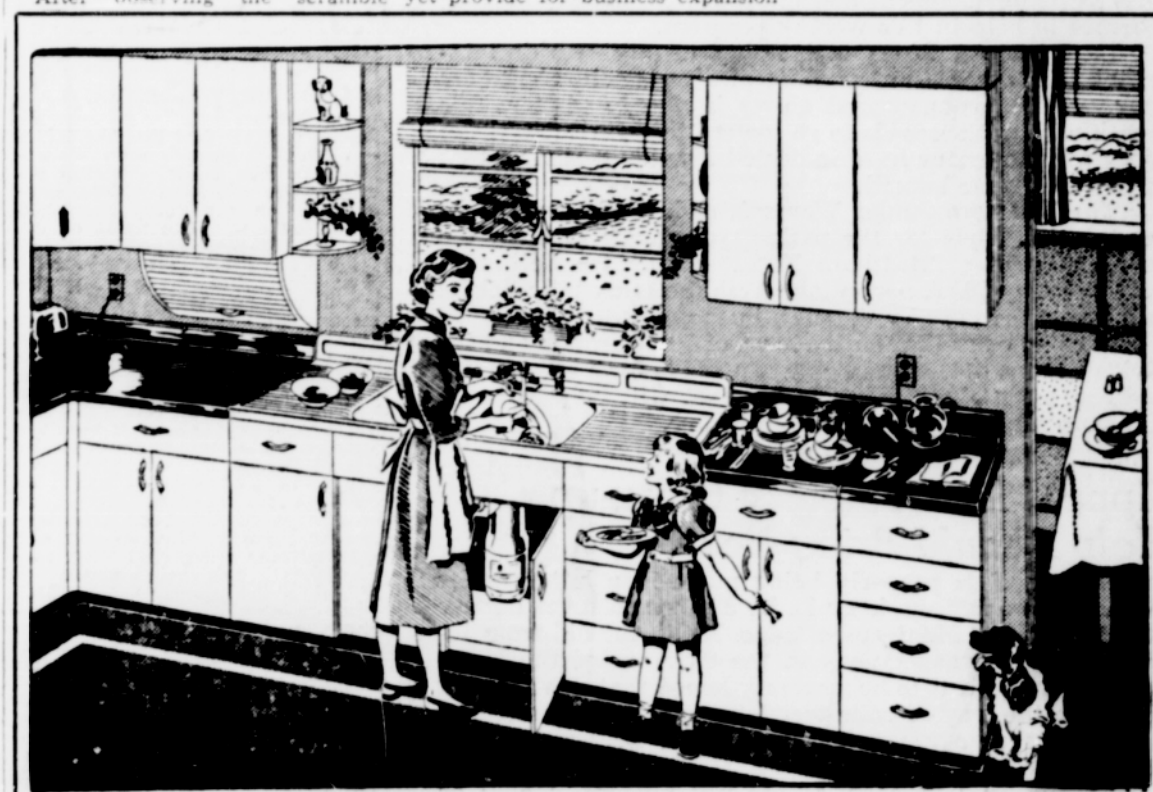

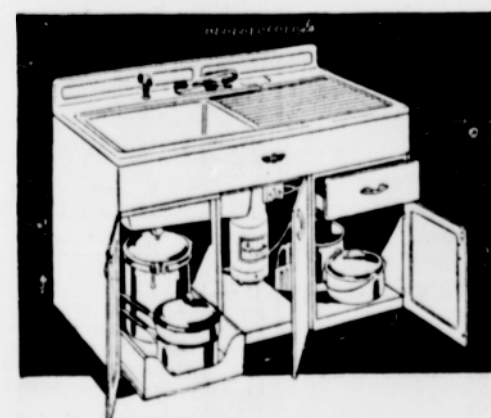
