

Responsibility of Public Stressed; "Miss Hillsboro" Candidates Guests

The public has a responsibility in helping to maintain the fish life of the state, declared Clark W. Johnson, executive vice-president of the Washington Federal Savings and Loan association, in speaking before the chamber of commerce here Tuesday.

The speaker, who was speaking at the annual meeting of the Washington Federal Savings and Loan association, said that the state has a tremendous responsibility in handling this valuable resource and it should have the cooperation of the public.

The game commission representative pointed out that there are 14 fish hatcheries in the state with costs running about 20 cents for a 25 per cent of the cost of the hatcheries. This figure, he said, is based on the cost of 80 cents per fish and Washington on a \$3 license fee. It was pointed out that log jams, etc., serve as barriers to prevent fish from getting back to the spawning grounds.

Johnson on Return from East Holds Federal Housing Path to Socialism

All O. Johnson, executive vice-president of the Washington Federal Savings and Loan association, returned Monday from Chicago, where he attended a meeting of savings and loan association executives for a three-day intensive discussion on plans, programs, policies and procedures. Over 300 association managers were in attendance.

In commenting on the drive in this country at the present time for public housing, Johnson said: "It seems to me that the future of home ownership and small proprietorship for the American children now in school will be decided by whether or not a nation more government subsidized housing is developed. The tragic path of Great Britain toward nationalization of land and homes was paved by small beginnings in government ownership of shelter. Ninety-six per cent of the dwellings built there last year were for permanent public ownership with any-occupancy family rent being paid by the local or central government, and now it is impossible for an individual to build a home of his own kind. The same arguments for the kind of government ownership of housing that were used here, that is, now being used here, that is, the argument that it is the only way to clean up slums and that such a little housing will not hurt slum clearance is not necessarily true up with the replacement of slums by permanent government owned housing when it is possible to take constructive action in regard to unhealthy and unsafe living conditions in our cities by starting with the enforcement of sanitation ordinances and matching local and state funds with federal funds to clean up slums and prepare the land for re-development without the costly burdens of government owned housing and the bureaucratic burden of a public housing official who eventually becomes the proponents for more and more government-owned and government-subsidized housing."

During the week I was in Chicago, the executive committee of the U. S. Savings and Loan League went on record adopting a four-point platform in connection with the housing legislation which has been passed by the senate and is now under consideration by the house of representatives in Washington, D. C. This four-point platform is as follows:

1. A slum land acquisition program to be initiated immediately with federal grants and loans administered separately from the government housing which is already built.

2. That a select committee of the

congress be sent to England to investigate the results there in that "tragic experimental laboratory" of which happens when a "little government housing is approved, built and then further government building and ownership of homes is voted here."

3. Establishment of clear definite income limits for occupants of present government housing projects.

4. Rapid expediting of the national housing census planned under this bill.

This bill that is now being considered in the congress authorizes the construction of 400,000 government-owned housing units. However, a short while ago, he said, the commission of the public housing agency said before a committee of congress that there are "6 1/2 million families in the United States who need subsidized government housing."

This would mean that about one-fifth of our population would be having part of their rent paid by the other four-fifths. This fantastic goal of those who are socialists in the housing field will be just around the corner once there are as many as a million publicly housed families with their power to swing political balance when strategically scattered as they will be.

That is why it is so important that the nation see clearly what it is doing if it countenances further expansion of government tenancy. 600,000 to 1,000,000. While this program has not bothered us here in considerably in the east. It is an insidious program that if allowed to grow to the point where the spectre of government tenancy is raised, it is its head to where we in the west can see it, it will then be too late for us to do anything about it. I believe that we can really do something about it by writing to our congressmen urging them to give this bill serious and careful thought before they allow us to be pushed further down the road to socialism."

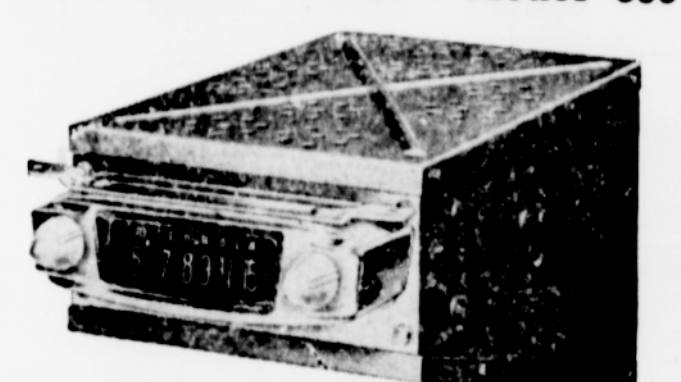
