

Importance of a Hospital To Community Cited Here

Everyone in a community is given a sense of security by having a well organized, well staffed, well managed and well equipped hospital, declared Dr. C. H. Manlove, Portland pathologist, in speaking before the Rotary club here Thursday on "What a Hospital Means to a Community" in observance of National Hospital Day.

Dr. Manlove was pathologist at Good Samaritan hospital for 25 years and now operates a laboratory of his own in Portland. He is a member of the staff of the Jones hospital.

The speaker pointed out that a hospital to attain a class A rating such as held by Jones hospital in Hillsboro must meet rigid standards. Inspectors must be at regular intervals, according to Dr. Manlove, who said that the hospital must have an accredited staff and managers, proper equipment and space and the right facilities. Records are inspected and analyzed, he said.

Hospital charges, declared Dr. Manlove, are not excessive when compared with the service given and with costs of 60 years ago. He pointed out that for instance in some cases much longer hospitalization was required years ago, resulting in greater loss of time. The per diem cost in Portland hospitals, he said, runs \$16 a day. It was also pointed out that it takes one and a half persons to every patient and this in addition to equipment, supplies, etc. He said it was remarkable that a hospital is able to carry on as it does on its charges. They are open 24 hours a day to meet emergencies and by this service is able to save the lives of many, it was stressed.

The Portland pathologist pointed to the importance of a hospital as a business asset to the community in that it employs a large number of people and must buy large amounts of supplies.

Praise was given by Dr. Manlove to Sam and Minnie Coy for developing a remarkable hospital that has attracted a fine staff.

Sam Coy was program chairman. Honored guests were Mrs. Coy, the founder, Dr. D. E. Wiley, a charter member of the staff, Dr. A. O. Pittman, staff president, and Mrs. Carrie Al Elliott, supervisor in nurses at the hospital.

Joyce Harramp was introduced at Rotarian of the month from the high school and Peter Melhuus, the new student body president. W. W. Winans made the introductions. State Revenue Allocations to Cities Given

Allocation of liquor and highway funds to Hillsboro for the fiscal year, July 1, 1948, to June 30, 1949, total \$18,806, according to a study of state revenue allocations to cities made by the League of Oregon Cities. Total liquor fund allocation was \$2,178, divided as follows: manufacture and importers tax, \$872; permit fees, \$976; license tax, \$330. Highway fund allocation amounted to \$16,628. This is based on the 1940 census of 3747.

Beaverton's total allocation, based on a census of 1492 taken by secretary of state's office since 1940, is \$7961 of which \$908 is from liquor and \$6953 from highway funds.

Forest Grove's total allocation, based on the 1940 census of 2449, is \$12,151 with \$1231 from liquor and \$10,920 from the highway fund. Cornelius allocation, based on a population of 781 taken by the secretary of state's office since 1940, is \$4892 with \$450 from liquor and \$4343 from highway funds.

Sherwood's allocation, based on a population of 563 taken by the secretary of state's office since 1940, totaled \$2897 with \$307 from liquor and \$2590 from highway funds.

Banks allocation, based on a population of 336 taken by the secretary of state's office since 1940, amounted to \$1,738 with \$240 from liquor and \$1,498 from highway funds.

Gaston's allocation of \$1694 included \$300 from liquor and \$1,394 from highway funds. This was based on a 1940 population of 333.

Tualatin's allocation, based on population of 238 taken by the secretary of state since 1940, amounted to \$1,208 of which \$146 was from liquor and \$1,062 from highway funds.

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Hearing Slated On Milk Prices Portland Area

A public hearing to consider revision of official orders issued by the Oregon Department of Agriculture relating to minimum prices paid producers of fluid milk and wholesale and retail prices to be paid by consumers in the Portland Sales Area will be held at the Neighbors of Woodcraft Hall, S. W. 14th and Morrison streets, Portland, beginning at 9:30 a. m. Monday, May 23, according to notices published by the milk control section of the department of agriculture under authority of the Oregon milk control act.

Revision of regulations concerning the Portland pool from which milk supplies are obtained for more than one half of the population of Oregon, regulations governing trade practices in the Portland sales area and revision of the boundaries of the Portland sales area will also be on the agenda.

The hearing will be conducted by E. L. Peterson, director of agriculture, assisted by Thomas L. Olsen, chief of the milk control section of the department.

The Portland market is supplied with milk from more than 900 dairy farms located in Multnomah, Clackamas, Washington, Yamhill, Polk, Marion, Tillamook, and Lincoln counties in Oregon and Clark, Cowitz, and Skamokawa counties in Washington. Monthly sales in the Portland area are 13.5 million pounds of milk containing more than one-half million pounds of butterfat. This volume of production accounts for a substantial part of the agricultural income of farms in northwestern Oregon and southwestern Washington counties.

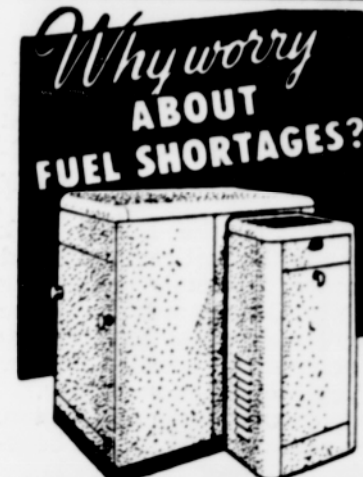
Billion Dollar Firm

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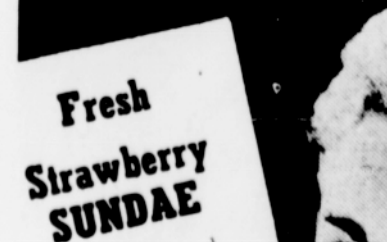
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
