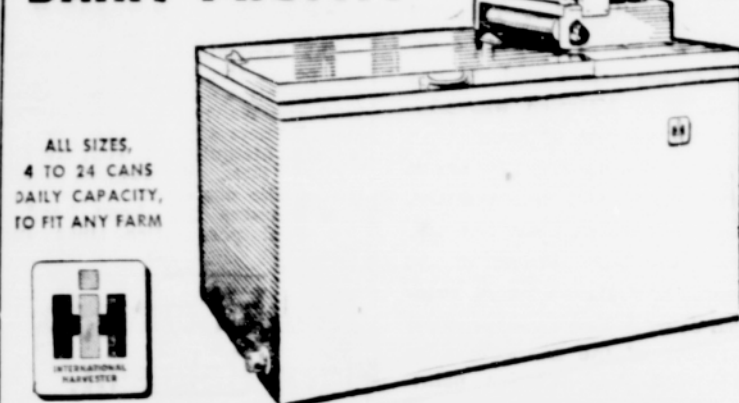
of lots being scarce in the cemetery. New Mower Used

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Special Election Okays Two Bills

Results of a special budget election for the City of Cornelius held May 31 have been tabulated and show two of five proposed measures were passed by the voters of the city.
Passed were bills to raise the millage to allow for increased expenditures to improve the police department and to authorize a special levy to raise needed funds for improved street maintenance.
Three bills which failed to get the voters' nod were ones to authorize special levies for the purchase of a new road grader and a new fire truck and also a bill which would have provided for a 20-year contract with Portland General Electric company for street lighting.

O. L. Barlow, 54, operator of a farm at Boring, died Thursday in a Portland hospital after a short illness. He formerly lived in Cornelius and built the Barlow Custom cannery there which is now the Cornelius Custom cannery.
Barlow was born in Colby, Kan. in 1895 and moved to Oregon with his parents in 1903 where he spent his lifetime. He was a member of the Forest Grove Christian church.
He is survived by his wife, Anna Tillson Barlow; four children, Mrs. Robert Sprague of Vancouver, Wash.; William L. Mary Caroline, and Robert L., all of Boring.
