Polio Incidence Showing Decline

Oregon's polio incidence, although up for the past five months and three weeks of 1949 has been showing a decline during the past five weeks, and the state's highest hit county in 1948 has been entirely free of new cases this year.

The facts were made known in reports from the state board of health and state headquarters of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Polk county, with 29 cases and the state's highest incidence last year, has been free of polio so far this year. Felix Montes, the Foundation's Oregon representative, pointed out that the Polk chapter has spent more money on its 29 patients than it has raised in 16 years of March of Dimes campaigns. Additional assistance has been forwarded by the National Foundation. Four Polk county patients are still hospitalized.

Benton, Yamhill and Jackson county, heavily troubled with polio both this year and last, have seen their rates shrink sharply in recent weeks. Montes conjectured that the early-year outbreak in 1949 "might have been the tail-end of their 1948 epidemics."

Fund Deadline Set for July 15

Oregon war veterans' organizations must apply by July 1 for state funds authorized to help such groups pay the cost of veterans' rehabilitation work.

The advisory committee to the state Department of Veterans' Affairs, which will administer the fund, has ruled that all organizations believing themselves eligible for a share of the appropriation should submit written applications to the department at least 15 days in advance of the hearing, which is scheduled for July 15 in Portland.

Vet Fund Set

A sum of \$33,529 has been set aside by the state veterans' agency to distribute to eligible veterans' groups during the next two years, in accordance with Chapter 364, Oregon Laws, 1949, to cover certain expenses incurred in assisting veterans or their next of kin on claims for pensions, compensation, hospital and medical care and other benefits.

Hearing Scheduled

William F. Gaarenstroom, department director, said the advisory committee will consider all applications July 15 at a hearing to determine which organizations are eligible under the law and the amount of such funds each organization will be entitled to.
