and 1925. She was a member of the student loan committee of the grand chapter for many years and held that position at the time of her death. Membership was also held in Nydia temple, Daughters of the Nile. She was the organizer and first mother advisor for the Hillsboro chapter of Rainbow Girls.

A member of Phoenixia temple, Pythian Sisters, she had served as most excellent chief and was a member of the Past Chiefs club. Memberships were also held in the American Legion Auxiliary, Hillsboro, Grange and Hillsboro chapter of PEO Sisterhood. She was also a past president of the Hillsboro Coffee club.

Rachel Lena Craddock was born in Kansas May 2, 1880, the daughter of Robert H. and Charity Craddock. The family moved to Joliet, Ill., and after a short period to Oregon in 1902. She was graduated from Thompson grade school and Washington high school in Portland. Following completion of a teachers' training course in Portland, she became an instructor in physical education and had a life certificate in the Portland school system.

Here Since 1918

On August 24, 1918, she married R. Frank Peters and moved to Hillsboro, which had been her home ever since. Survivors include the widower, an adopted son and daughter, Robert F. Peters of Hillsboro and Mrs. Ann Fitzpatrick of Chicago, and a granddaughter, Kathleen Fitzpatrick.
