## Time Payments Increasing

Local credits are increasing in Oregon this year, but not at the same rate as in the rest of the nation, which is a good sign for this state's economy.

Businessmen are turning to time payments, extending credit to meet demands in trade volumes. David Holtzman told a convention of credit officials meeting in Salem Tuesday.

"People still have cash but they have lost confidence because of falling prices. Merchants are turning to charge business to revive sales," Holtzman told the credit adjudicators.

## Site Fight Tight—'Quite'

The continuous-bid scrap over the location of "Oregon's branch capital" in Portland is about to be decided. Twenty-four proposed sites for the \$2,500,000 state office building have been proposed with share-

rivalry between the east and west side locations.

Options on six of the sites will be taken by the state this week. Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry, member of the state board of central, stated Monday. Options will cover three properties in west Portland and three in east Portland. If options are promptly obtained a decision could be reached by July 18, the date of the regular weekly meeting of the state board of central.

State Fair Prizes Up

More than 3000 prospective exhibitors this week were mailed a copy of the 1949 premium list of the Oregon State Fair which opens September 5. The prizes offered total more than \$75,000, an increase over 1948.

State Fair Manager "Opens Labor Day" Leo Spitzbart says the many early entries indicate a record number of exhibits in beef, dairy, poultry, rabbit and other livestock divisions. Entries in the open livestock classes close on August 5.

Summer Schools Popular

Over 6000 students are enrolled in the current summer school sessions of state colleges and universities. This is an increase of approximately 8 per cent as compared with the 1948 enrollment.

The rate of increase is greatest in

the Oregon College of Education and Portland Extension center classes.

Judges' Fund Large

The judges' retirement fund created by the 1941 legislature now has in its credit \$76,621, as against \$52,979 a year ago. State Treasurer Walter Pearson announced this week.

The fund consists of \$10,000 appropriated from the general fund of the state, \$19,338 transferred to the fund from the state's general account, \$35,000 withheld from salaries of circuit judges and justices of the state supreme court, and \$3,324 in earnings and investments. Only \$1,600 has been paid in retirement benefits.

New Legal Opinions

Real property of municipal corporations held by taxable persons under lease executed prior to July 3, 1947, is subject to ad valorem taxation for the fiscal year 1949-50. Attorney General George Neuner ruled this week.

Neuner also ruled for the state tax commission that to have state income tax returns microfilm by a California firm would be a violation of the state law. That income tax returns can't be seen by persons outside the tax commission.
