Police Collect \$2039 in June, Chief Reports

City of Hillsboro police made 87 arrests and collected \$2039.79 during the month of June, according to Chief of Police Melvin DeRock.

Driving violations accounted for the largest number of fines totaling \$1277.20, intoxication running second with \$285, and 67 days in jail being sentenced. Drunk while driving brought \$206 into the city treasury and disorderly conduct netted \$133 from four violators. 475 parking violation fines put \$132.50 into the city purse. Fifteen burglary and larceny reports were investigated by the police with one case being settled and the remaining 14 still unsolved. Stolen property recovered by the local authorities was valued at \$738.50.

During the month, the police collected a total of 4,707 miles in the city. DeRock announced that the police department is slated to receive a new car.

In St. Moritz, Switzerland, people are paid to shovel snow into the street because horse-and-sleigh taxis are very popular.

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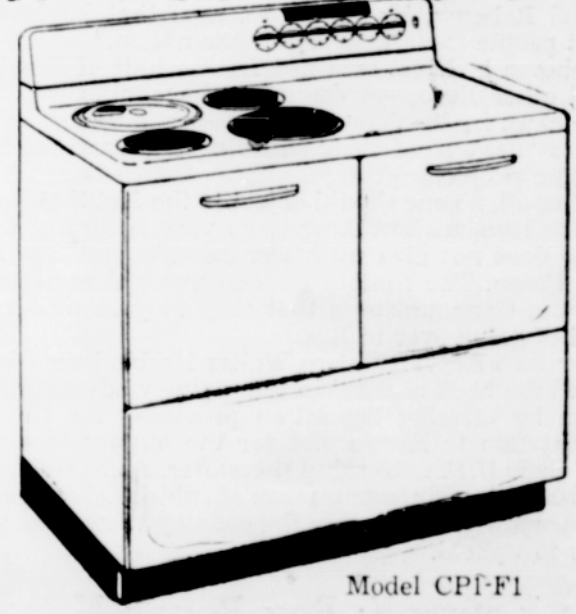


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
