Mrs. Coy said that because of the longshore strike in Hawaii their ship unloaded its passengers three miles out of the harbor and they were taken in on barges. If it had gone into port, it would have been tied up in the strike, she said.

Other effects of the strike were noticeable in the islands, she said. Among them were the scarcity of eggs, potatoes, bread, grain foods and onions. When meat was served in restaurants, they added a special service and freight charge for the extra cost of having it flown in. Although there was no actual shortage of food as a whole, the foods that they were used to eating were not available. Milk could be purchased only by a doctor's prescription, she said.

During the month they were there, they paid visits to the other main islands and found them much more natural than life in Honolulu. They attended Hawaiian feasts, or luaus, and one party at which the guests were required to attend barefoot. Native Hawaiian foods were served.

They found that not all the available crops were being harvested because of the shortage of cans since the strike.

The entire return trip was made by airplane via San Francisco.

1 1/2 cups sifted Crown Best Patent Flour
2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder
1/2 cup sugar
