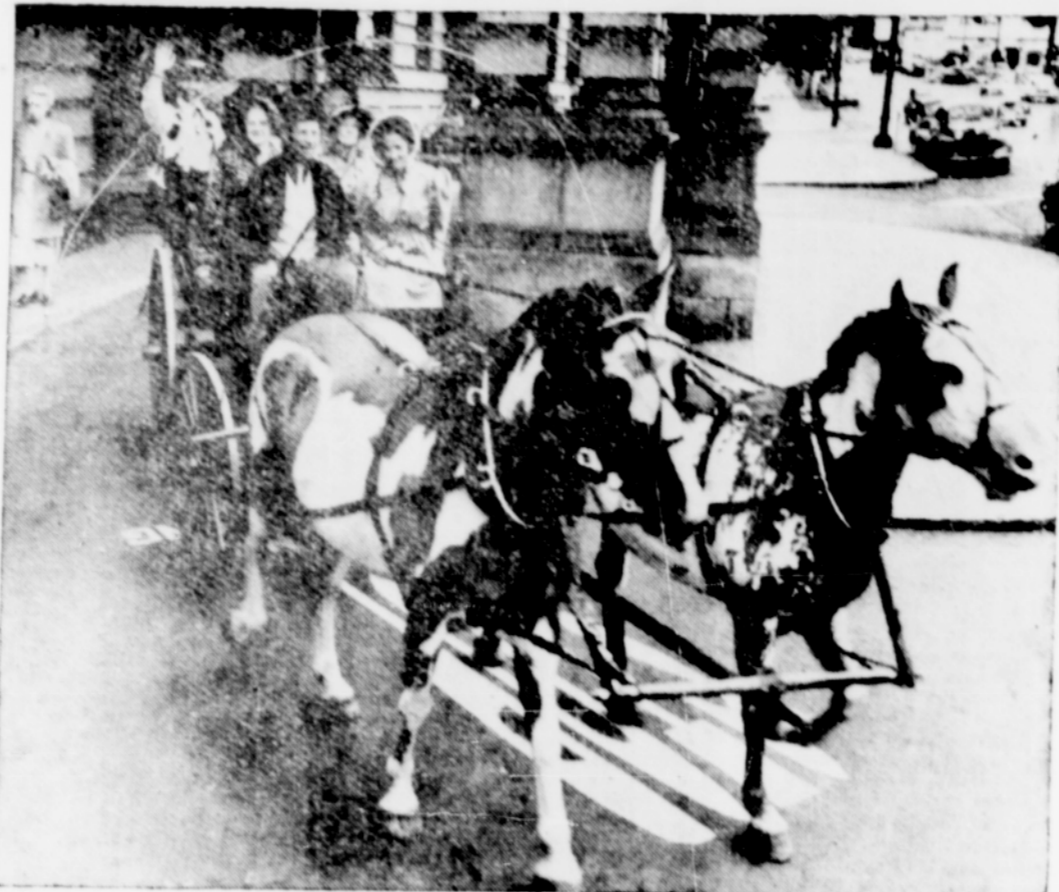


## Birthdays to Be Honored; Family Gatherings Held
