European Seed Demands Lessen

Curtailing demands for U. S. seed in Europe because of increased supplies and a shortage of dollars are reported in a special study made by George C. Eiler, statistician of the Department of Agriculture.

The report is based upon a first hand study of field and vegetable production and demand, conducted last year under the Research and Marketing Act.

The European Recovery has stimulated European purchases of U. S. seed, the report says, but certain countries are spending scarce dollars on other U. S. exports they feel are more urgently needed. The quantity of seed exported to Europe, however, could be greatly increased, Mr. Eiler states.

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Lindow Cow Completes Production Test

BRATTLEBORO, Vt., July 11 — Lona Fox Alma Juhanna, a registered Holstein-Friesian cow owned by Lindow Brothers, route 5 Bethany, has completed a 362-day production test of 716 pounds of butterfat and 13,827 pounds of 4.4% milk in Herd Improvement Registry test. Testing was supervised by Oregon State College in cooperation with The Holstein-Friesian Association of America.

This cow was milked three times daily and was three years, five months of age when she began her test period.

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
