### Mystery Plant Baffles Owner

Mrs. Agnes Lovell, of 280 West Walnut street, is puzzled at the identity of a strange plant growing in her front yard. When she dug the plant out of the sand on a cliff at Yachats three years ago, it was hardly larger than a lead pencil. It achieved no spectacular growth until this spring, when a series of stalks shot up rapidly until the plant is now about 3 feet in height. This odd growth possesses characteristics of several other plants, for it has leaves resembling those of a walnut tree, a hollow stem an inch or more thick like a huge water rush, and a white flowerhead with a remarkable similarity to that of the common wild carrot. The various stems emerge from a sheath-like organ, and the leaves grow from the end of the sheath. A number of people, seeing the oddity from the roadway, have stopped to inquire about the plant. Mrs. Lovell reports that the plant is extremely hardy, since the two months of cold and snow during last winter took no effect on it.
