While DDT residues are not as acutely poisonous to humans as many other common spray materials, care is necessary with vegetables to see that residues left are kept low to avoid any danger from daily consumption, reports Dr. R. H. Robinson, chemist, and Leon Terriere, research assistant, in an OSC experiment station circular of information, "DDT Residue Problems on Vegetables."

DDT at proper concentrations and under approved methods described in the circular may be used safely on practically all garden crops except spinach, lettuce and similar leafy vegetables. With broccoli and tomatoes no late applications are recommended. With beans no applications after pods are three inches long are recommended except where processing will remove residues.

Family Relations Work Expanded OREGON STATE COLLEGE Appointment of Dr. Lester A. Kirkendall as the first full-time teacher in the field of family relations and preparation for marriage has been announced by Dean Ava B. Milam, head of the school of home economics, in which Dr. Kirkendall will be associate professor.

One of the nation's leading educators and authors in this field, Dr. Kirkendall will come here from the University of Illinois. He was previously director of the Association for Family Living in Chicago.

While courses in family life have been given in home economics for many years, this is the first time a full-time specialist has been engaged, making possible expansion of courses open to both men and women from all schools of the college. Dean Milam adds that addition of Dr. Kirkendall to the staff is a "symbol of the importance of man's place in the home."

Army Promotion Improved, Sgt. Cowan Reports

How many times have you heard some doughy veteran of World War I say, "I went into the army as a private, and I came out as a private—I was in the infantry!" So stated Sgt. Keith Cowan, who appears at the county courthouse several times a week to accept enlistments.

"I've heard that story many times, and of course I know that it was true—then. But I also know that it isn't true any more. Our modern doughboys are serving in infantry that is quite different from the foot-slogging outfit we had to use against the Kaiser in 1917, and even from the partially mechanized 'Queen of Battles' that wrested western Europe and the South Pacific from the enemy in World War II," Cowan said.

"I've done some checking, and here are the facts to bear me out: As late as 1941, there were exactly two Master Sergeants authorized for an Infantry Regiment. There was a first sergeant (then in the second pay grade) for each company—a total of 15 for the regiment—and when one staff sergeant was assigned to each company, commanders wondered what to do with them.

"Today, believe it or not, there are 31 non-coms in the first pay grade—that includes Master and First Sergeants now. 106 second-graders (now known as sergeants first class) and 381 sergeants (formerly called staff sergeant, in the third pay grade). That's a total of 518 'first-three-graders' in every infantry regiment out of 3614 enlisted men.

"Don't tell me there are no opportunities for promotion in the infantry!"

Teaching Sex Facts to Child

I THINK we practically all agree that as soon as the young child wants to know where babies come from he should be told calmly and frankly by his parents that the baby grows in its mother's body. We also agree pretty generally that parents gradually should give the child further facts about sex as he grows old enough to understand, and make this child want to learn all such facts first from his parents; that the more confidentially the child beyond the age of four or five treats such facts the more wholesome the effect.

But I surely don't agree with many of the writers and teachers, who practically say or imply that, if the child's curiosity about sex facts is satisfied by parental instruction, this child will be sufficiently armored against undesirable sex experimenting and practices.

Started School

The mother of a boy and a girl four writes: "We have never had any great problems concerning these children. But since our son has started to school we have run into the problem of sex education. We live in the country and there are only ten pupils in the school. But from things I hear they all have an idea about sex and it's usually a distorted view. We have never tried to hide anything from Jimmy but he has just never asked. When he was only four we had a cat about to have kittens and I told him and he would sit for minutes at a time very gently feeling the kittens moving inside the mother-cat's body. Then when they were born, I let him watch. Since then he has never been curious.

"But the other night when he came home from school, he said Jean, second grade, and Donny,

first grade, told him they had a secret that the seventh grade boy did to a sixth grade girl. He was in quite a state because they would not tell him. When my husband came home he suggested we give him some more sex information and explain that there are some things that are not proper to do."

Might Have Occurred Even if all these children had been treated as this mother treated her boy in regard to the kittens and mother-cat, the same nasty incident referred to as a secret might have occurred. Early and constantly children need to learn that such acts among children as this should not occur. But no amount of explanation could absolutely guarantee their prevention. Those school children need more supervision at school and elsewhere and some inhibitions at home.

This incident belongs to a general class of all kinds of deceptive sneaking, clandestine conduct against which every child needs to be armored not only through desirable inhibitory controls but also through strong positive suggestions from every possible angle. Certainly the ideal gotten over to children in a lovely family atmosphere, of great respect for another's person and his or her body ought to be of great value. I believe we want to get over to the child quite early that anything he wants to do without letting anyone see him do it or know about it is the very kind of thing he can always be sure is not right to do. To make this effective, we want this child to feel always eager to tell us of any or all his experiences.
