BETHANY—The Bethany Presbyterian church voted Sunday to sponsor a family of displaced persons from Europe. The action was taken at a special meeting called by Elder E. Ray Miller who explained that Portland Presbytery is attempting to place 24 families in this section of Oregon. The family will be selected from United Nations camps for exiles from Communist dominated areas. The congregation accepted full responsibility for transportation, employment, and housing. It was voted to ask for a Protestant family of six or less persons. Arrangements should take about six months.
