Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Pellett observed their golden wedding at their home here July 30. They were married in Oklahoma.

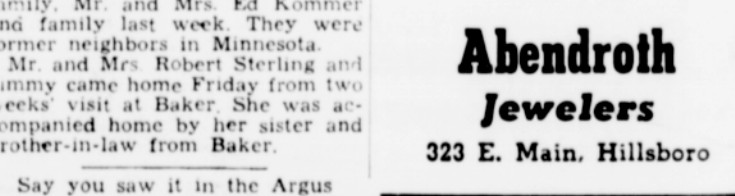

New Food Freezing Process Used at Cedar Mill Market

Ultra modern is the word for the vacuum seal meat freezing process installed at the Ideal Food market at Cedar Mill by Barney Miller and Joe Smith.

The new seal process has been in operation at the food market for about a month and is meeting with great success, according to the owners.

The process consists of putting the food to be frozen in a plastic bag and then removing all the air through the use of a vacuum pump and then dipping the sealed goods into a vat of water at 190 degrees. This dipping causes the bag to shrink around the food, making a very neat appearance.

The cost of the process, say the two operators, is about one cent a pound more than the conventional double wrap method. This type of frozen food preservation is used for vegetables, meats and produce and will preserve the foods longer than any other known process.
