Kids Attempt to Dethrone Giant Earthworm at Fair

Earthworms and night crawlers are getting tough breaks these days as the boys and girls of Washington county seek out their hiding places in an attempt to match the giant size of the world's largest earthworm soon to be in Hillsboro for its first appearance in the Northwest.

Recent action of the fair board

These worms, which are close kin

to the giant, six-foot earthworm to be displayed, have been known to reach a length of 12 inches in Washington county, according to best information available. A committee of Hillsboro businessmen, including H. L. MacKenzie, Jake Weil, and A. W. Hoffman, has been appointed to give advice to youngsters on how best to catch these prize fish bait.

Special Containers Needed

The worms must be packed, one worm to an exhibit, in a small glass container with moist earth. The name of the contestant (not the worm) must be firmly affixed to the container with the address. On the day the contest is to be judged, each exhibitor must be ready to assist the judges to measure the worm.

Preparation is being made to display the giant worm in a special booth at the fair grounds. The local giants will be given a place of honor in the booth, and the winners will be marked with a blue ribbon. Involved preparation for the shipment of the immense worm is now underway in California where it is appearing at San Mateo County fair. The freak is expected to arrive in Hillsboro early next week, and will be immediately prepared for exhibit at the fair grounds.

Plans still are under discussion for a possible worm race to be held at the fair grounds some time during the fair in which the largest of the worms brought in for exhibit will be matched on a special racing course. Permission requested to install pari-mutuel betting at this race course has not yet been received, the board has reported.

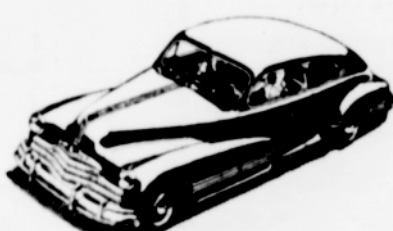
