

Orient Struggle Is Christianity Against the Reds

The struggle in the Orient is Christianity against communism rather than democracy against communism, Paul W. Travis said Sunday at the First Baptist church.

Travis, who recently returned from a tour of the Orient, spoke at the church Wednesday through Sunday and showed slides taken during his trip.

The Japanese people lost faith in Buddhism and Shinto with the loss of the war, he said, and they are now looking for another faith. The two possibilities open to them are communism and Christianity, according to Travis.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur has recognized this situation and has asked for Christian missionaries in Japan, but only 500 have responded to the call, while the communists have more than 500 paid workers in Tokyo alone, he said.

Because Japan is a democracy and not the autocracy some people think it is the communists are allowed to enter the country, Travis related.

He stressed that the course Japan takes will likely influence the world trend, since two of the three large powers of the Orient are already communist—China and Russia.

American customs are being adopted readily by the Japanese. About 60 per cent have adopted Western style clothing in favor of the traditional kimono of Japan, he said.
