

Hillsboro People Participate in Highway Rites

Dedication of the new wide Columbia highway between Troutdale and Bridal Veil Saturday afternoon drew a number of Hillsboro residents.

Governor Douglas McKay made the dedicatory address.

The ceremony took place on the new bridge at Troutdale. Walter E. Meacham, secretary of the Old Oregon Trail, Inc., gave the early history of the region, and introduced those taking part in the pageant, all dressed in pioneer costumes.

Mr. and Mrs. John Gates of Hillsboro represented Col. Joseph Meek and his wife, Virginia Meek. Mrs. Gates, a granddaughter of Col. Meek, was the only direct descendant of a pioneer in the east. Characters represented by Lewis and Clark college students were Capt. Meriwether Lewis, William Clark, Dr. John McLoughlin, Jesse Applegate, and Samuel K. Barlow. Capt. John W. Beard, who with his wife made the trip over the Old Oregon Trail on horseback several months ago, represented Sgt. Patrick Gass, and Saccagawea was represented by the queen of Seaside Centennial celebration, Miss Meisel.

T. H. Banfield, chairman of the state highway commission, presided and introduced the speakers, including former governors, highway commissioners and mayors of cities along the route. L. A. Johnson of Hillsboro was inducted as one of the assisting engineers.

After the dedication and cutting of the ribbon opening the highway, the caravan left for Bridal Veil with Gov. McKay riding in a 1901 Oldsmobile driven by Tom Baker, which was one of a fleet of old-time cars leading the way. Mrs. McKay also rode in an old-time car.

At Corbett, beautiful bouquets of gladioli were given to each car. Gladioli also decorated telephone poles en route to Troutdale.

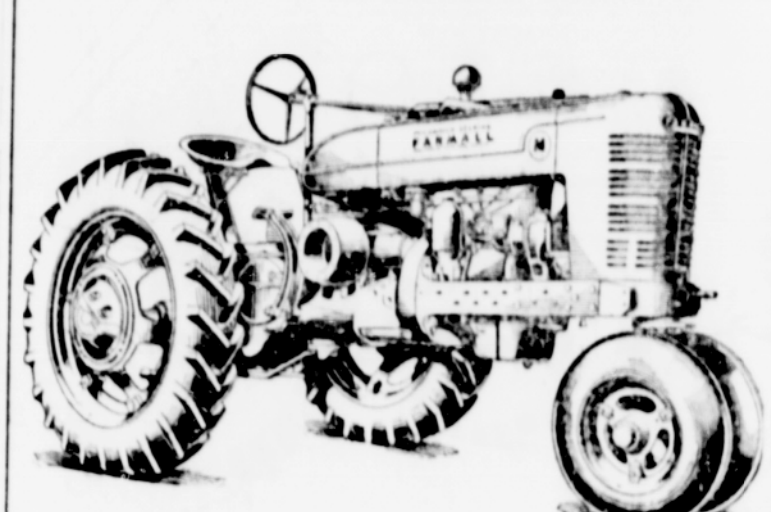

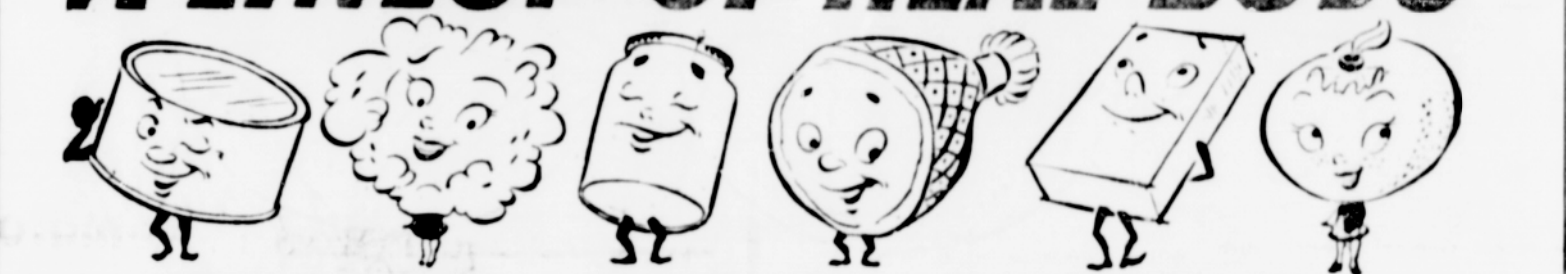
