

Legion to Help Vets Apply for Insurance Pay

The American Legion will assist all local veterans in applying for their National Service Life Insurance.

This was announced Wednesday by Earl Morley, commander of Hillsboro Post No. 6.

"Our post will have the necessary applications which veterans will have to make to the VA to get their NSLI dividends," Commander Morley said. "Every veteran who holds his NSLI policy for 10 days or more will have a refund coming to him. The VA expects to pay approximately \$2,000,000 in these refunds. Payments are expected to average about \$125 according to the VA. Applications should be filed as quickly as possible because it will take weeks and months for a veteran to get his refund check."

Actually, Commander Morley explained, the American Legion will not get the biggest dividend in this money in trying to locate veterans who are eligible for the NSLI refund.

The VA estimates that some 16,000,000 veterans are entitled to NSLI refunds," Commander Morley said. "Actually the VA has the money added of only six million eligible veterans. The American Legion will help it to locate 16,000,000 others."

In Hillsboro, the Legion will assist all veterans, whether Legionnaires or not. Starting next Tuesday, Chuck Thompson will be at the Legion club during the day to help persons needing this assistance. Other members will be at the Legion club evenings to help veterans make out application forms.

Mobile Chest X-Ray to be Here At County Fair

The Mobile Chest X-Ray Unit will be at the county fair September 1, 2 and 3. The hours are 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. September 1 and 2, and 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. September 3.

The screening of large numbers of people for tuberculosis by the use of chest X-rays has resulted in an appreciable number of cases of primary carcinoma of the lung being found at a stage in which surgical intervention may be effective.

As with tuberculosis, prompt detection and treatment before symptoms appear give the greatest hope for complete recovery.

Your Washington County Tuberculosis and Health association urges all persons over the age of 15 years to get their free chest X-ray, according to Mrs. Zola Morgan, executive secretary.
