Dependent Children Deserted
 No one will refute the fact that hungry, ill-cared-for children are most invariably become embittered against the laws of society and the government. Yet the 1949 legislature ordered a 15 per cent cut in aid for dependent children. However, as the facts were presented to the lawmakers, at the time of the enactment of the law, they should not be censured for the move.

Resolutions deploring the effects of the law are arriving at the welfare commission from county welfare departments. The principal criticism is that all the cut was made on dependent families and none on aid to the blind and old age assistance. A smaller cut all around would not have been so keenly felt.

The conditions are often too pitiful to pass under the name of civilization in families where the mother is left as head of the household by death or desertion or where the father is physically incapacitated.

Welfare departments have carefully screened cases now coming and find there is greater need in many instances than in the earlier months of the year.

When winter comes there are bound to be new cases true care but no funds are available.

The children, if not cared for, soon become delinquents.

Political Unflap
 The gentleman from way down south in Oregon, this program may soon be addressed to the president of the U. S. senate, if the proposition of a federal soothay-ers here at the capital comes true.

Farm Bureau To Capital
 The moving of the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation from Milton to Salem this week was celebrated with a progress caravan of cars and trucks carrying equipment and staff of men. Welcome ceremonies were given by mayors and chamber of commerce officials along the route.

The spirit of the purpose of the organization, Governor McKeay welcomed the caravan at the conclusion of the trip.

The federation will be located in the same building as the Salem chamber of commerce. A campaign will start soon, said President W. Lowell Steen, to back up the governors of western states in their fight against the Columbia River Administration power development scheme.

Oregon Drivers Improving
 While the motor vehicle drivers of the rest of the nation are "stepping on the gas" more and more Oregon drivers are holding down to normal speeds says Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry, who quotes figures from a national speed study.

The study found that the average motor vehicle traveled at 19.47 miles per hour in 1947; the 1946 rate was 45.2. In the same time Oregon vehicles reduced their speed from 50.1 to 46.8 miles per hour.

National highway reports reveal that 92 per cent of Oregon's passenger vehicles exceed 35 miles per hour and 99 per cent exceed 45 mph and 21 per cent topped the 55 mile per hour designated speed.

Register War Trophies
 Several accidents caused by exploding war trophies recently have prompted the bureau of internal revenue to prepare a new bulletin notifying the public of the required registration of certain types of trophies that, in many instances, were sent or brought home as war trophies. It is mandatory that firearms of automatic type must be registered unless they have been cleared by certification by a competent officer. It is illegal to transfer arms of this type except by payment of the \$200 tax, unless the firearms have been rendered unserviceable.

Penalty for violation of the act is a fine up to \$2000 or imprisonment up to five years or both fine and imprisonment.
