

State to Direct Training Course

Arrangements were made in Hillsboro last week with L. V. Eaton, state supervisor of distributive education, to hold a six week training course at the chambers of commerce rooms, beginning October 12, according to W. W. Wiggins, chamber manager. He said the course would be held on Tuesday night from 7 to 9:30 and will cost \$2.50 for the course.

The course will be open to all persons in local retail businesses. Wiggins reported that employees are encouraged to send employees, as well as attend themselves. He said that tests would be given at the end of the course as well as final grades.

Blind Spokesman Asks Recognition

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This manpower should be utilized, it was pointed out that about 10 per cent of the 39 million employed in this country have physical disabilities of varying degrees. About 100,000 disabled persons, qualified along on file at present. Only 90,000 of these are veterans.

Tests Made

"This is no hit or miss proposition," said Greider. "They pay their way not because of their disability but in spite of it. State employment offices give examinations to test their physical capacity, mental IQ, and vocational aptitude."

The blind speaker, who had his seeing-eye dog at his side, asked that equal consideration be given non-veterans, since they are in the majority, and need the same opportunities as those disabled during wartime.

T. Morris Dunne, chairman of unemployment compensation commission, said about 50 per cent of the handicapped make more money than they did before their injury occurred. "They're safe workers," he added. "They can't afford to make any mistakes."

Also present at the meeting were Eldon Cone, area supervisor of Oregon State Employment Service, to purchase the books determined on the basis of 10 cents per census child. Teachers made the book selections.

County School Courses Set

Three courses are being offered through the Washington county school extension program during the fall term. Austin Scraftford, county school superintendent, said this week. Courses are open to anyone.

A geography course will be taught at Tigard elementary school on Wednesday nights, a speech course for the classroom teacher on Monday nights at the B. W. Barnes school in Hillsboro, and a course in organization and administration and guidance at the Forest Grove union high school each Saturday.

The geography and speech courses will be held from 7 to 10 in the evenings. The class at Forest Grove will meet from 9 to 12 a.m.

According to Scraftford, all courses will carry three hours of credit. Enrollment fee is \$10.50 per course. All courses have started or will start this week and end in December.

Courses to be offered during the winter term include the second term geography, counselor training workshop, method and materials for the teaching of art and visual education.

Spring term classes will be geography, occupational and educational information, and community resources, the superintendent added.

The 1947-48 school statistics report that Washington county's combined grade and high school education cost per pupil was \$159.04 compared to the state combined average of \$216.79 for the same period.

marketing agreement, 30 per cent of the crop must be withheld for shelling.

Greater prices on filberts Monday settled to a range of 10 to 11 cents a pound, after the marketing agreement with its 25 per cent set-aside became effective. Trade estimates were that 1500 to 2000 tons—about 20 per cent of the crop—were shipped before the pact became effective October 1.

The association was holding to its opening prices on filberts, although, independents were under-selling the crop as much as two cents. Local growers report that the Washington county filbert harvest is practically over.

The nut industry has requested government aid in the form of subsidy payments on the large quantity of filberts and walnuts to be shelled under surplus provisions of the marketing agreements.

views that good service can be maintained on a minimum of \$150 per capita. This, it is pointed out, is a substantial saving in homes where books and periodicals are bought outright for home reading. It means books for a year for less than one magazine subscription, or reading entertainment for a year for the price of three 50-cent movies. The \$150 is also one-half the amount required by the Portland public library from Washington county borrowers, and totals very much less than average book rentals from rental libraries over the space of a year. From an economical standpoint, it is vastly superior and more economical to support a county library than to get books in any other way, it was stressed.

Retired Writer Dies at Tigard

Mrs. Leona Cass Baer Hicks, a former drama editor for the Oregonian, died Monday at her home near Tigard, where she had been living in retirement since 1941. Mrs. Hicks had been seriously ill since May, 1948.

Born November 19, 1881, in Bloomfield, Ia., she attended the state teachers college at Kicksville, Mo., and the Art Institute of Chicago. She came to Portland in 1904 and took an art teaching position with St. Helens Hall school for girls.

The following year she started work on the Portland Oregonian and stayed with the paper until the late 20's. Afterwards she went to Hollywood, Cal., with her husband, Harvey W. Hicks, whom she married in 1919. The couple remained there four years and she did free-lance motion picture writing.

Surviving are a sister, Mrs. E. T. Bennis, and a brother, Franklin G. Baer, Portland.

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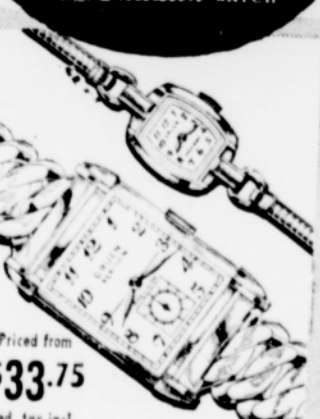
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
