Farm Fires Will Get You If You Don't Watch Out

It may not always be the "other fellow" who sets the fire.

Only a few minutes of carelessness in one way or the other is a major factor in 99 per cent of all farm fires, fire officials say.

Common fire hazards are faulty chimneys, flues, improperly stored gasoline and oil, hot ashes and open fires, defective wiring, and spontaneous combustion.

The fire hazard inventory is a list of fire hazards in farm homes and buildings. It is a checklist of things to look for and correct.

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Canned Food Use Campaign Headed By Hillsboro Man

A special fruit committee of the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation has launched a campaign to sponsor a state-wide campaign to reduce the use of canned food.

Meeting in Portland, the Farm Bureau committee surveyed statistics on increasing costs over the past three years.

Ed Carothers, chairman of the committee and secretary of Hillsboro, stated that consumption of large cans of surplus would be disastrous to fruit growers in the northwest.

A special campaign on the theme "Stock Your Pantry Shelves" is expected to get a long way toward relieving surplus of canned fruit in the northwest, Carothers said.

The campaign is sponsored by the Oregon Farm Bureau, which asks the cooperation of all growers in Oregon. The Oregon Fruit Growers Association has offered its full cooperation.

The National Association of Food Chains has endorsed the last two weeks of October for a national campaign. The Oregon campaign is planned for October 12 through October 29, to coincide with the national campaign.

The campaign was conceived at a meeting of representatives of the Food Distribution Organization with the American Farm Bureau Federation, fruit and vegetable committee in Chicago July 25.

Carothers and his committee urge all farmers and Oregonians to lend utmost support to the canned fruit campaign. The future of the fruit growing industry in the northwest largely depends on reducing the large surplus of surplus.

One planting project this year, now underway, is scattering seed over outcrops of land from a helicopter, Schreiner reported.
