Spartans Roll at Will In 52-13 Record Win

Hillsboro's Spartans rolled almost at will through a leaky Forest Grove defense Friday night on the Pacific university field and wound up stomping the Vikings, 52-13, thereby racking up their third TYV triumph of the season and breaking a couple of records.

The 39-point margin was the largest ever tallied by a Hillsboro team in the 31 years of the Spartan-Viking rivalry. The 52 points which Hilhi put on the scoreboard represent the highest total ever scored by a Jim Davis-coached Hillsboro team.

Davis obviously wasn't trying to pour it on a hopelessly outclassed Forest Grove crew Friday night but there was nothing he could legally do to halt the scampering of a gang of touchdown-happy backs who rolled up 423 yards rushing and another 53 yards passing before a merciful final gong ended the affair.

Regulars in First Half

The regulars saw action only in the first half, with a few momentary exceptions, and had amassed 26 points before the intermission while blanking the Vikings.

The Spartans weren't content to grind out touchdowns on sustained marches. Four of the eight touchdowns counted by Hilhi were on runs of 30 yards or more. Right Half Jerry LeBlanc rambled twice in the first half and a reserve left half Don Bahnsen, stepped to another pair of long ones in the second half.

Guard Dale Christiansen intercepted a Viking pass on the second Forest Grove play from scrimmage. (Continued on page 2)

McMINNVILLE—The Badgers of Pacific university made an auspicious beginning in Northwest conference football play here Saturday night by stampeding to four touchdowns in the second half to blank the Linfield Wildcats, 25-0. The teams battled through the first two periods of play to a scoreless stand-off.

In the first half, Linfield's Arnold Huntley punted the Badgers back on their heels repeatedly. The Paul Slagg crew then fought off Wildcat scoring attempts.

Intercepted passes set up three Pacific touchdowns after the intermission and the fourth came after a recovered Linfield fumble.

After the game, visiting Badger fans attempted to remove the goal posts and a melee resulted when Wildcat supporters came to the defense. The goal posts stayed up and things settled back to normalcy when the stadium lights were turned off.

Whitman college is on the agenda this week as the Badgers continue conference play Saturday night at Forest Grove. The game will highlight homecoming festivities on the Pacific campus.

Tigard-Pioneer Tilt Highlights Friday Schedule

Newberg led, 6-0 at halftime, and the Tigers counted the winning touchdown in the third period, with Dick Riley going over from the 10-yard line. Braves Smother Hilhi Seconds By 54-6 Count

FOREST GROVE—A sharp crew of Banks Braves scored heavily in every period here Saturday night to blast the Hilhi "B" squad, 54-6. Banks led at halftime, 26-6.

Four Braves scored touchdowns in the one-sided contest. Milo Elkins, big fullback, accounted for three of them, while Halfback George McGreer and End Ralph Perkins scored two each. The eighth was racked up by Halfback Frank Cross. Elkins also kicked three extra points.

Hillsboro's single score came in the first quarter when Halfback Al Leopold rambled 50 yards down the middle on a quick-opening play.

McGreer highlighted the evening with brilliant open field running. His pair of touchdowns was scored on gallops of 35 and 40 yards. He also took off on a 60-yard excursion but was hauled down three yards short of a score.

Three Banks regulars, Verle Prickett, Spike Kommer and Duane Caudill, were held out of action by Coach Les Pete Saturday night because of pulled leg muscles. They may not be ready to go Friday night when the Braves play Galesburg at the Forest Grove baseball park.

The Hilhi B's will meet Oregon City on the foreign field today (Thursday).

Hilhi Freshmen Win Third Tilt

Hilhi's freshman footballers remained unbeaten last Thursday as they turned back Newberg, 13-0, on the Tiger field. It was the third win for Hilhi.

In the first quarter, Fullback Bob Hankinson counted the first touchdown on a pitchout. Everett Sandy passed to Ken Davis for the conversion point to build the 7-0 lead held by the locals at halftime.

The same coached Spartans didn't add their final six points until the last quarter, when Les Weisenbach took a pass from Bud Heinrich for a touchdown. Newberg, meanwhile, never did come up with a scoring threat.
