

Banks Man Gathers Oddities of World

In a small wooden structure on the farm of Henry (Hank) Vandehey of route 1, Banks, is a collection of everything from arrowheads to animal horns from all over the world.

These two parts of his hobby of collecting everything which might be of interest to the public are just a fraction of the work put in by the 59-year-old farmer on his unique avocation.

Hank started out collecting when he was 14 and "one thing just led to another" and at present he has just about covered the field. To list the many parts of his hobby would require a catalog but to briefly name some of them, we may begin with arrowheads and carry on with guns, horns, carvings, coral, walking sticks, stuffed animals, sea shells, pipes, snuff boxes, coral, petrified fossils and wood, Indian pottery and rock utensils, Swiss bells, Asiatic spears and war gear and strangely-formed pieces of wood. There are many more of less-extensive work, but nevertheless collected and interesting.

Likes to Trim Trees

Another time-user is the work on trees and hedges which Hank has fancied. He has trained and trimmed a hedge of Hemlock into the shape of a snowman and he has worked two hemlock trees into one and has shaped the two into the form of an arc with two spheres on top.

Vandehey's gun collection is outstanding. It includes firearms of all types and some of the dates on the barrels go as far back as 1840. Sport and military arms as well as dueling pistols are included in the 150 or more firearms hanging on the wall of the small building housing the hobby.

His carvings are the most unique of all he has worked out faces and figures on pieces of wood found in the forests. The faces range from comedy characters to Pacific natives. Hank started carving as a youth and has developed into a professional whittler.

world seem to rate the favor of Vandehey as he eagerly displays them and will go into detail to explain their origin and value to him. Included are a set of longhorns from the now extinct Texas longhorn, which measure seven feet from China, India, Africa, Alaska, the Pacific islands, and from all over Europe and the United States.

One item which caught the eye of the writer was a small mechanical organ no larger than a tomato box. Created on the same principle as the player piano, the organ is hand operated and has the volume and quality of a full-sized organ. Hank acquired this antique in central Oregon and figures it is over 100 years of age.

This story could be written into volumes and not just describe the amount of material and work given by Hank to his hobby. To gain the full value of his work a person should visit his hobby house at his farm one mile east of Banks. The register in the hobby house has a room for many more names.

Only one thing worries the spry collector and that is who he is going to get to carry on his work when his collecting days are over.

The hows and whys of wills came in for varied discussion at Monday night's "Estate Forum," at All Saints church parish hall under sponsorship of Commercial National bank.

Paul Patterson and Jim Burdett, representing the bar association; Grant Johnson, speaking as an insurance representative; and Herbert Rasmussen, trust officer at Commercial bank, answered a wide variety of questions.

Patterson spoke on "Hazards of Short Cuts in Avoiding Probate," and clarified many points which people should keep in mind. Burdett delved into the subject of "How Is an Estate Handled," explaining briefly how Oregon law applies to real and personal property.

Johnson, speaking on "Life Insurance in Estate Planning," told how insurance could be a cushion against the day when cash would be needed to take care of probate costs. A. L. Amacher, CPA, has been scheduled to speak on "Estate Taxes" but was unable to attend because of a council meeting.

Rasmussen said the bank's trust department will act as executor of estates for the same fee an individual would handle it and in addition offers the advantage of its wide experience on such matters. He said the bank offers group judgment on these matters, pointing out that three heads are better than one. Refreshments were served following the question and answer period.
