Lightning Storm Halts Hillsboro Power Last Week

Lights and power were off in this area for about 20 minutes last Thursday between 1:43 and 2:05 p.m. as a lightning bolt knocked the entire Pacific Northwest power pool apart, impairing services throughout the region from Seattle south to Eugene.

The local power unit, part of the Portland General Electric system, went out as soon as the power system lost its entire load. Power was restored as soon as standby and steam plant units were switched into operation. A short while later the PGE system resumed the normal power.

Emergency Handled

Airra radio stations went off the air, many Hillsboro business operations were temporarily suspended and highway traffic signal lights on Baseline went out during the period. Hillsboro's James hospital was supplied with emergency service by PGE during the blackout.

Among the many local plants, the Argus office and mechanical shop were shut for a full hour and 17 minutes. The failure shut down presses and linotype machines.

Nearly 300 employees at the Birds Eye-Snyder plant were forced to stand idle for nearly 30 minutes until power was returned to the PGE system. Plant officials said that persons working close to the outside of the building were able to continue with work, but they indicated that most of the parking operations were forced to stop at the power went off.

Lights went out here last Thursday as the Northwest power pool fell apart for the first time in its history after a lightning bolt struck a big transmission line linking Bonneville dam with the J. D. Rose substation, Vancouver, Wash.

It was the first time, Bonneville power administration officials said, that two major substations—Rose and Covington—were down for one minute. Power disruptions occurred almost everywhere Bonneville lines run or in private utility lines connected to the Bonneville system.

Storm Hits Hillsboro

The same storm that caused the Northwest "darkout" was part of a general thunder and lightning storm that hit the coast late Thursday morning. It was shortly before 1 p.m. when the storm hit the Hillsboro area. Skies darkened, peals of thunder were heard and were soon followed by lightning and heavy rains.

Lightning did no damage locally, but the rains that followed disrupted local harvesting operations. Both filbert and walnut picking operations will probably be speeded up by the rains, according to a report by Alvin Elkins, manager of the Hillsboro state employment office. He said the rain caused the walnuts to fall more rapidly and generally brought on the crop quicker than usual.

Test Announced For North Plains

Federal Civil Service announces an examination for appointment to the position of substitute clerk, post office service.

Persons who desire permanent positions at North Plains will have an opportunity to take a civil service examination leading to permanent appointment with permanent classified civil service status.

No specific experience or education is required, but applicants must take a written examination, which includes a sorting test, general test and a following instructions test. Applicants must actually reside within the delivery of the post office for which examined, or be bona fide patrons of such office.

Applicants must be between the ages of 18 and 50, except that these age limits may be waived for veterans and under certain conditions for war service indefinite employees.

Further information on this examination and the necessary application forms may be obtained from the Postmaster, Post Office North Plains, Oregon, or from the Director, Eleventh U. S. Civil Service Region, Room 302 Federal Office Building, Seattle 1, Wash.

This examination will be held at Portland, Oregon on October 29, 1949, at 8:30 a.m.

Reserve Officers Training Scheduled

Lt. L. L. MacIntyre, North Third avenue, Hillsboro, has received orders from the civil engineer corps reserve officers training program October 16 to 29 at Thirteenth Naval District Headquarters, Seattle. He will be among about 30 C. E. C. reservists attending.

All four states of the Naval district—Washington, Oregon, Montana and Idaho—will be represented.

Included in the two-weeks school will be lectures on design of earth-quake-resistant structures, amphibious warfare and orientation of public works duties and responsibilities. The officers will be brought abreast of post-war developments in the Navy's Bureau of Yards and Docks under which the Civil Engineer corps operates.

Some of the C. E. C. officers attending will take the schooling as their annual training duty for Naval Reserve, with full pay and allowances.

The group will make conducted tours of various Naval activities in the Seattle area.

Davis said the group would talk over both sides of the proposition as well as methods by which the objective may be accomplished. He also reported that the group would lay plans for the circulation of more petitions requesting a ballot issue for the 1950 May primary elections to finance the project.

People Sign Petitions

At a meeting held last month, more than 75 representatives of county organizations voted to support the county fair board plans for asking the new fairgrounds south of the Hillsboro airport. The group also approved the circulation of petitions to place the tax levy on the ballot. Manager Davis reported today that petitions handed out at the last meeting had already been turned in. He said that more petitions would be given out at the next meeting later this month.

The fair board's recommendation to the county court asking for preliminary work at the fairgrounds this fall is also expected to come up for discussion at the meeting. At the last session, organization representatives favored the preliminary grading work at the grounds. However, members of the county court expressed opposition to the proposal. County Judge H. D. Kerkman voiced the opinion that the court would rather postpone the work until the proposed tax levy was placed on the ballot and approved by county voters.
