Gaston Tramples Vancouver Deaf School Crew, 19-0

GASTON — The hopeful Greyhounds of Gaston high jumped into the win column last Friday by trampling Washington State School for the Deaf, 19 to 0. It was the first time in four meetings that Gaston had beaten the Vancouver school.

The Greyhounds kicked off but soon had the ball. Right End Don Spidal started the Greyhound attack with an end-around which netted 29 yards.

It was in the fourth quarter that the Greyhounds felt they were going to be scored upon. The visitors drove to the Gaston 30-yard line, but that was all. Gaston made one attempt to score in the fourth, in which many reserves were playing. It was started by a pass from Spink to Spidal that netted 35 yards and another of Spink's long ones that netted 23 yards to the opponents' 20-yard stripe.

Deer Hunters Slow to Report

Deer hunters report card returns are lagging behind last year, it was announced this week by the Oregon State Game commission. Almost 3000 cards have been mailed into the Portland office of the commission at this time, but more than three times that many had been returned after the first week of the 1949 season. All hunters who purchase a deer tag are required to send in the completed return card. This must be done whether a kill is made or not and whether the tag buyer hunts or not.

Early returns always run high in kills as those hunters not having had a kill usually wait until the close of the season before reporting. To date out of 2965 returns 2828 have been reported. In kills, Lake, Deschutes, Klamath and Tillamook counties lead the list of kills at this time.

C. A. Lockwood, Oregon state game director, stated that he hoped the Oregon hunters would continue the fine cooperation in making these returns that was evident last year. The returns in 1948 in Oregon were as high as any state has ever had. Lockwood said that the law allows the commission to refuse tags the following year to any hunter who fails to make a report. He also stated that administrative machinery has now been set up which will enable the commission to cross check these returns.

"I feel certain that the hunters in Oregon want to co-operate in furnishing the needed information," Lockwood said, "and I certainly hope that it will not be necessary to refuse future deer tags to hunters failing to report."
