### Tillamook AAUW Gives Panel Talk

Three members of the Tillamook unit of the American Association of University Women presented a panel discussion on current events at the AAUW meeting Saturday afternoon at Forest Hills Country club.

Mrs. Alfred Bosquet explained the situation in China, where a Communist government was recently declared. She told how the geography of the southern part leaves it open to attack. There is a real need for long range reform, Mrs. Bosquet said, but she emphasized the importance of finding a happy medium in effecting changes.

Because of the attitude some Westerners have toward China, she said she could not blame the Chinese for distrusting the West. Mrs. Bosquet stressed the importance of sending people to China who understand the country and the people.

She summarized her talk by quoting a Chinese proverb: "If we survive the winter spring will come again."

Mrs. Robert Thornton, state International Relations chairman, presented a brief resume of communism in Russia and the current conflict with Yugoslavia. "Communism makes converts by promising them what this country has," she told the group.

Miss Dorothy Doyle, president of the Tillamook unit and Tillamook county librarian, suggested books of current interest.
