Guernsey Sale Set For 4-H, FFA, Vets

FFA and 4-H members, and World War II veterans will be exclusive bidders at a combined auction sale of purchased registered Guernsey heifers, which will be held at 1 p.m. Saturday, October 22, at the Oregon state fair grounds. This sale is sponsored by the Oregon Guernsey Breeders' association, and is the fourth such sale to be held in the state in an effort to make available to the future breeders good foundation animals which they can add to their projects in order to build quality Guernsey herds.

A total of 32 head of heifers, ranging in age from 6 months to 2 years, some of which are bred and some of which have already freshened, are to be consigned to the sale. Twenty-four of the heifers will be open to bidding by 4-H and FFA members only. A head will be open to bidding World War II veterans only. Lunch will be available at the sale pavilion at noon.

A catalog of the sale has been printed, copies of which, along with additional information regarding the sale, can be secured from county agents, 4-H agents, FFA instructors, or by writing to the American Guernsey Cattle club, 302 Corbett Building, Portland.

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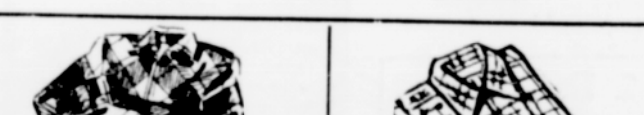
