Kelsey Grandson Of Early Pioneers

Oscar Kelsey, who died October 14 and whose funeral services were held Monday, October 17, at the Peninsula Funeral Home in Portland, was born June 16, 1884, on his father's farm, one and a half miles south of Hillsboro. He was the son of Francis Marion Kelsey and Nevada Stewart, who were also born in Hillsboro.

His grandparents, Isaiah Kelsey and Winnie Williams Kelsey, crossed the plains and arrived at what is now Hillsboro on October 16, 1841, and took up a donation claim on which the north side of Hillsboro is built. His grandfather also donated the land on which the Washington county courthouse now stands.

Oscar Kelsey was married to Jessie Epperson of Hillsboro, April 30, 1905. To this union two children were born, Rollan Gordon Kelsey and Mrs. Velda Kelsey Elias, who survive. Other survivors are his wife and three grandchildren.

He attended the David Hill school in Hillsboro when a boy, and his last trip to Hillsboro was to attend the dedication of the new David Hill school.

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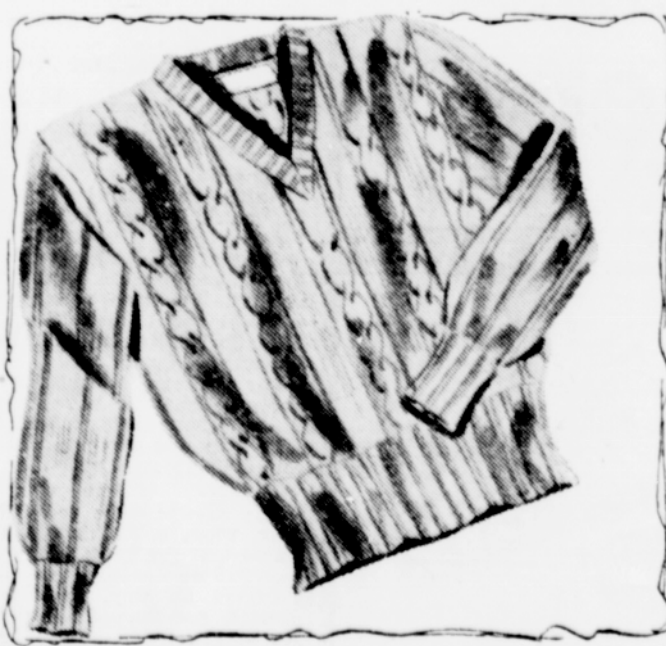
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
