A 1902 Oldsmobile, one of the original "merry ones," will be among the late models displayed at the grand opening of Washington County Motors Saturday at their new building on West Baseline.

In speaking of creating better understanding throughout the world, McCandless told the junior members that the idea may seem rather remote at this time, but stated that he likes to think of those now engaged in a junior capacity at the Senior Red Cross members of tomorrow.

The conference program, arranged by Junior Red Cross Chapter Chairman Zola F. Morgan of Hillsboro, in cooperation with area office in San Francisco, was divided into three sections during the afternoon in order to have activities and lectures corresponding to the age group.

The knife-like thrusts of Hillsboro's halfbacks, which have made the Spartans the highest scoring team in the league, are the main item of concern in the Grizzly camp. No team in seven games has been able to hold the Spartans to less than three touchdowns.

The Grizzlies probably should be rated as slight favorites for two reasons—they will have the unquestionable advantage of playing at home and they should get some mental stimulation from the game last year. The Grizzlies lost that game, 14-0, and haven't forgotten that the defeat cost them undisputed possession of the league crown and the right to represent district 6 in the state playoffs.

Grizzlies Are Big

Ever since the equipment came out for the 1949 season, the Orle Robbins crew has been touted as a definite contender for the state championship and a victory over Hillsboro would send them merrily on the way.

The Grizzlies are big, no question about it. The Grizzly backfield averages 181 pounds per man, even with 155-pound Jerry Florey at quarterback. The massive line averages 184 pounds and boasts two guards, Dave Anderson and Bob Hughes, who exceed 200 pounds each.

The Grizzly crew is as big as the Salem outfit. Fifteen other Spartans considerable trouble although Hills won 20-7.

are a few ads for one and two-room apartments.

A Washington county teacher unable to attend the hearing was represented by another person as being against decontrol. It was disclosed that she had undertaken a survey of the entire city of Hillsboro in search of apartments where children are accepted, and "she did not find a single one available."

Sees More Construction

Favoring decontrol, E. A. Griffith said there is much to be said for both sides, but he believes removing controls will encourage construction of more rental units, of which there is a great need in Hillsboro. There has been very little building here since rent control was put into effect, he said, and the city has grown considerably.

Joseph Vandervelden of Forest Grove pointed out to Mayor Harry Seabold and council members that many veterans returning home found that their former landlords had sold their homes and moved into cheap dwellings themselves, becoming tenants taking advantage of low rent.

It was also claimed at the hearing that tenants who share in city conveniences, such as fire and police protection, should share in the cost. The council was told that tax payers are tired of footing the bill while tenants get by on rent as low that improvements on the property cannot be made.

Several landlords, the majority of those present, said they have been tempted to get rid of their apartment houses because of the strict federal control measures that in Portland for the past three years, and is survived by a sister, Mrs. H. M. Glen of La Jolla, Cal.

Free Enterprise Gives Highest Living Standard

The American free enterprise system has given us the highest standard of living in the world, declared C. W. Tebbutt of Portland in speaking before the chamber of commerce Tuesday. In spite of this, he said, we have many who would like to change our form of government.

Under free enterprise the individual has the opportunity to become his own boss, while under communism the individual works where he is told, explained the speaker. It was also pointed out that here we have the right to argue and criticize in contrast with strict controls under the reds, and that here we look on police as our protectors as compared with fear of police under a communist dictatorship.

Widening of ownership among the people of the country was pointed to as the answer to assaults on the free enterprise system. The speaker held that the purchase of savings bonds draws off funds that should go into industry. It was also cited that high taxes are drying up the sources of investment capital.

Money at Work—a moving picture showing the story of America's investors, of the millions of our people whose savings built American industry and made possible the world's highest standard of living, was shown. The picture also gave the story of the investors' market place, the New York stock exchange, and how it serves the individual security-owner, industry, and the entire economy.
