

House Interior Guttered by Blaze On Connell Road

A fire destroyed the interior of the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Gaffie on North Connell road Sunday afternoon while the owners were visiting a sister in Estacada.

The couple had left half an hour before the blaze was reported by a next-door neighbor, Earl Bartlett, who said he rushed into town, and asked someone to send an alarm. He returned immediately to see if he could help control the fire and stated that a Hillsboro fire truck passed him on the way.

Firemen quickly chopped a hole in the roof to make room for an additional hose, while neighborhood residents hauled furniture and belongings from the house.

Mr. and Mrs. Gaffie, who did not learn of the incident until their return that evening, commended the fire department for quick action in saving their home from complete destruction and expressed appreciation to persons who removed the furniture.

The fire originated in the attic from defective wiring, it is believed, and burned through the flooring to a bedroom below. The back bedroom, containing a bed, several dressers, and other pieces of furniture, was completely gutted by the flames.

The owners said that not a single piece of furniture was without some type of damage, but thanked the neighbors for saving as much as they did. They have been living with friends during the past few days, and will not be able to live in their home until major repairs are made. The roof, which is listing to one side, will have to be completely rebuilt. The house was covered by insurance, but they stated it does not take care of many things gathered during their lifetime.

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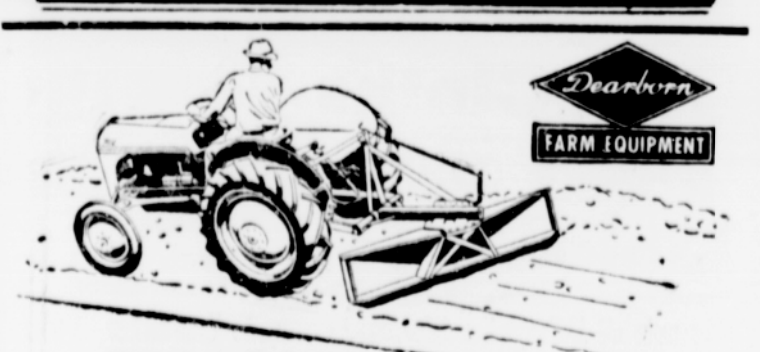
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
