Kopplin Bull Wins Silver Medal Award
COLUMBIUS, O. — A registered Jersey bull owned by James R. Gates of Seaside, Wash. and John Kopplin of Gaston, Ore., has been given a silver medal by The American Jersey Cattle club for the meritorious production of his daughters.

The bull is Standard Dandy Sultan Six. Three daughters of the bull have completed outstanding milk records to qualify him for this record. They produced 428, 478 and 436 pounds of butterfat respectively in 300 days. The average production of these three cows exceeded that of the average dairy cow in the United States by more than two times.

Standard Dandy Sultan Six also has been officially classified for type by the club. He was rated Good Plus. This is equal to a score of 90 to 95 points on the breed's score card which gives 100 points for a perfect animal.

This production testing and type classification work carried on by Gates and Kopplin is part of a program for continuous improvement of the breed sponsored by The American Jersey Cattle club, headquarters in Columbus, O.

This sire was bred by John Kopplin of Gaston and purchased as a calf by James R. Gates in partnership with Kopplin.

A contract for the construction of a \$100,000 building to be used as living quarters for sisters at the St. Mary's Home for Boys at Huber was awarded Charles J. Johnson of Portland. It was announced by Father Gerace, superintendent at the home.

Work was started on the project Monday, and Fred Christensen's earth moving equipment was moved in Tuesday.

The proposed structure will match the present buildings at the institution, and will house 21 sisters teaching at the school. The 117 by 40 foot building will be hollow tile with stucco. A wing housing a chapel will extend 77 feet to the rear.

A central heating plant will heat the structure. Architects Jacobberger, Stanton and Zeller prepared plans and specifications.
