Robert Brown of North Plains, who has three sons who have several years of scouting experience, will be the new scoutmaster. One of his sons, Rex, will be a cub scout leader when the group is formed. Don Byatt, who is close to the parent eagle award, will be assistant scoutmaster.

Another meeting will be held soon to decide upon a regular meeting date for the proposed scout troop along with other business matters. William Troutman, Charles Cox, Ronald McCracken and Alvin Haage are members of the Boy Scout committee. The cub troop will probably be formed some time after Christmas.
