Study Guide Told To Rural Teachers

Miss Ljura E. Kellar, from state department of education, described a new study guide published by the department to members of Washington County Rural Teachers association Friday at B. W. Barnes school. The guide is for standardization of curriculum and continuity of effort and thought throughout the state.

Importance of considering individual needs of a child was stressed at the meeting of some 70 rural teachers. Miss Kellar said instructors should not be too concerned about making pupils memorize too much material, but should work with them as individuals.

Miss Kellar complimented schools of Washington county, said Robert Cochran, principal of B. W. Barnes. The Barnes gymnasium is used by teachers, Camp Fire Girls, club scouts, adult recreation program and basketball games, along with miscellaneous meetings throughout the school year.
