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High School PTA Hears Hobbyists

Three talks on unusual hobbies, plastic, color photography and stained glass, were given to members of the high school Parents-Teachers association in the Little Theatre at the high school Monday evening.

According to Mrs. D. C. Chambers, who discussed plastics as a craft material, the raw material is now available to all from the retailers and holds for the hobbyist the promise of a professional finished appearance.

"Pictures in color capture much that is not available in black and white," stated Ray Talbot, science instructor at the high school, as he gave hints to would-be color photographers. He illustrated his talk with slides taken in Oregon and various sections of Europe.
