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1950 Auto Tags Appearing Now
License plates for next year, which have been on sale at the secretary of state's office in Hillsboro since November 15, have been appearing on automobiles for the past week.

New plates for motor vehicles may be obtained at the state office on South Tenth avenue, according to Clark Bailey, manager of the local office.

A new system is being inaugurated with the current sale of plates. Bailey stated. The dates on the plates are staggered so they do not all expire at once. Rather, they expire continuously throughout the year so the load is lighter on the state offices.

Prices are governed by the numbers on last year's licenses, as is the length of time it will be good. Costs for licenses range from \$5.10 to \$14.45. After the initial sales, however, a standard cost of \$10 will be charged on each plate.

The aluminum, black-lettered tags have been on sale at the local office since November 15. They may be mounted on vehicles any time, Bailey stated, but warned they must be on by the first of the year.

Persons who wish to purchase tags are asked to bring registration papers. The office is open from 9 to 5 weekdays and from 9 until noon on Saturdays.

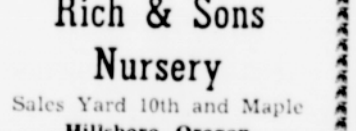

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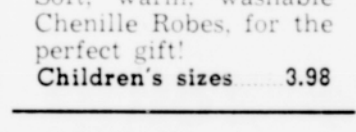
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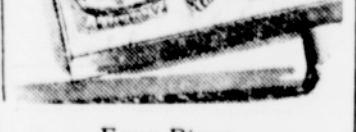
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
