UNION NOMINATIONS.

The following gentlemen were put in nomination by the Union Mass Meeting, held at the Court House on Tuesday night, for the several city offices. For Mayor—John F. Backenstus. Recorder—D. D. Gray. Marshal—David Froman. Treasurer—Wm. Caldwell. Councilmen—Chas. Mosley, Saml. Althouse, D. Beach, A. Marshall, J. H. Foster, Charles Riley.

All good and true men; property owners, who are interested in the growth and advancement of our city; old citizens, who have grown up with the city and are well informed as to the wants and needs of the community; business men, who will manage the financial affairs of the city in an economical spirit—in fact, a ticket, taken individually or as a whole, that we are proud of, and confidently look forward to its complete success at the polls on Monday next.

CHURCH ROBBER.—It becomes our painful duty to chronicle the fact that there is or has been in this community a thief so low down in the scale of infamy and vice as to rob a church. On Friday night of last week, some mean, no-souled wretch entered the Baptist Church on Second street, and forcing open the lock on the book-case containing the Sunday School library belonging to the school, took therefrom some seven or eight dollars, that had been collected among the children attending the school and intended to purchase Sunday School papers, which had been left there for safe keeping, no one supposing for a moment that persons could be found in this community so utterly lost to all sense of shame as to purloin money from a church. We don't wish the thief any harm, but his early demise would be a good riddance to any community, and we would cheerfully publish the same, gratis.

ALBANY LEGISLATURE.—A "refreshing season" was had by this body, on last Saturday night, over the bill for the abolishment of capital punishment, introduced by the member from Multnomah. The bill introduced by the member from Umatilla county in relation to the "Grecian bend," will be taken up this evening, and we judge from the accredited talent as a speaker of the father of the bill, will be handled in all its bendiferous magnitude. As this is a matter that especially appeals to the sympathies of the female portion of our city, we bespeak a full house to hear the talented member descend on this hump-backed subject. A feast of reason is looked for. Come one, come all.

ONE BOY STABS ANOTHER.—Two youths, named Adram Comley and Joseph Nixon, between the ages of ten and thirteen, on last Tuesday, "fell out about quarrelling," and in the fight that ensued Comley stabbed Nixon in the left hip with a knife, the blade making an ugly and painful wound, but is not considered dangerous. Had the wound been made a little higher up it would have entered the abdomen and doubtless proved fatal. There are a number of very "fast" youths in this community who are sadly in need of parental objection. Proper training now may save future disgrace and expense to the State.

CHURCH SERVICES.—We listened with pleasure to very instructive discourses, morning and evening, in the Congregational Church of this city, by the Rev. Mr. Geary, on last Sabbath. Mr. Geary is a popular and talented gentleman, and his friends will be pleased to know that he has consented to fill the pulpit of the Congregational Church every other Sabbath, until arrangements can be made for a permanent pastor. His first Sabbath under this arrangement, we believe, will be the 20th inst.
