TERRIBLE CALAMITY AT EUGENE

Three Children Burned to Death
A Mother's Love—Loses Her Own Life by attempting to Rescue her Children.
[SPECIAL TO THE REGISTER.]

EUGENE, March 19.—About four o'clock yesterday morning, the residence of Mr. Steventon was discovered to be on fire. The basement was entirely wrapped in flames before discovered. The family, Mr. and Mrs. Steventon and four children, were sleeping in the upper portion of the building. When the alarm was given, Mrs. Steventon remained to save the children by throwing them from the window. The oldest child leaped from the window and was saved. The heat was so great that Mrs. Steventon was unable to get the three small children from their beds, but only left the house when wholly blistered by the fire. The three children perished in the flames. Origin of the fire unknown. Mrs. Steventon died at 8 o'clock this morning, from the effects of the terrible burns received in attempting to save her children.
