## LOCAL AFFAIRS.

**CHANGE OF TIME.**—At the solicitation of parties in this city, through the accommodation agent of the P. T. Co., Mr. John B. Monteith, the time for starting on the Salem excursion has been changed. Instead of leaving this city Sabbath afternoon at 2 o'clock, the steamer will leave her wharf at precisely 4 o'clock on Monday morning, the 26th instant. This, although it necessitates early rising, will meet the wishes of a large proportion of those going to the Old Fellows celebration at Salem on that day. However, it may be well enough for all to understand that the steamer will start at 4 o'clock sharp, and those who calculate on any delay after that time will be disappointed. Tickets for the round trip will be \$1 50, to be had of the agent at the P. T. Co.'s office.

**LITERARY EXHIBITION.**—The literary exhibition given by the scholars connected with the Albany Collegiate Institute on Friday evening, 23rd inst., was greeted by the presence of a large audience. The declamations, orations, essays, dialogues, etc., were well delivered, and "brought down" the audience every whiz. The big "Junjun," "Hys Tyce, of Warm Springs," was nearly lightning on Jargon, and succeeded in "localizing" very well. The principal feature of the entertainment was the vocal and instrumental music, Miss Kate Conner presiding at the melodeon, assisted by Miss Ada Beach, Miss Nellie Cavinias, Mr. George Price and Mr. W. A. McCormack, of Eugene. The College paper was well read by its editor, Mr. Frank Beach, and contained well written articles. The exhibition was a success.

**LIFE INSURANCE.**—We have several times adverted to the benefits of life insurance. Such acts of liberality speak loudly in favor of a community, and are never forgotten by the recipient.

**MUTATION.**—Our old hotelist and a "rich specimen" on general principles, J. B. Sprenger, Esq., has removed to Portland, having bought out the interest of Maj. Cook in the Cosmopolitan Hotel of that city. We are sorry to lose the genial presence of Jake, but are pleased to know that he has "struck it" so soon. The "Cosmopolitan" will hereafter be under the management of Sewall & Sprenger, two of the most successful hotelists on the Pacific slope. They understand how to keep a hotel in the best sense of the word.

**RIVER.**—The Willamette, whose volume was increased by the rainfall in the fore part of the week, is now slowly receding.

**REMOVED.**—The telegraph office has been removed to Hiltabedel & Co.'s store, First street.

**COME BACK.**—Our old friend, Dr. O. P. S. Plummer, and family, arrived in our city the first of the week, from Rosburg, where they have been residing during the winter. We are happy to announce that the Doctor intends to remain with us permanently, which will be most welcome news to his numerous friends in this city and Linn county. He will still continue as Superintendent of the telegraph line. As a "wire worker" the Doctor has no superior on the coast.

**AN ADDITIONAL TEACHER.**—The attendance at the District School in this city is so large that an additional teacher is required, and the Directors have selected Miss Annie Smith as such additional teacher. The selection is a good one. The new teacher enters upon her duties on Monday. With such a corps of teachers in our public school, parents can look for the rapid advancement of their children in useful knowledge.

**SOMEBODY SOLD.**—A local item in the Unionist informs us that the Capital Engine Company, of Salem, had received and accepted a challenge from Albany Engine Company, to try the merits of their respective machines. The Foreman wishes us to say that the officers and members of the Albany Fire Company have never sent a challenge nor authorized any one else to challenge the Salem Fire Company, or any other company in their name, for the simple reason that they have no engine as yet, and grave doubts as to their having one soon are entertained. When the Company are in possession of an engine, and have had some drill in its use, a challenge might be sent or accepted with some show of propriety. At present our boys are not on it.

**DEATH.**—Again has death made his appearance in our community, and we are compelled to chronicle the mournful intelligence of two deaths in one night—that of Mrs. Abbott, wife of the editor of the Democrat, and Dr. Whitson, living in the vicinity of this city. Mrs. Abbott had been lingering with the consumption for months. She breathed her last on Thursday morning. The funeral took place on Friday. Mr. Abbott and family have the sympathy of the community in their bereavement.

**PERSONAL.**—Maj. Cook, late of the Cosmopolitan Hotel, Portland, called on us Monday. The Major is one of the handsomest men in Portland, and caused many an "I while here."

**BUTTER.**—Mr. E. W. Pike, who we spoke of some time since as intending to go into the dairy business, has got fairly to work, and is now making a superior article of butter for table use. A specimen of butter from his dairy, left at our office, is as nice, yellow, solid, sweet butter as we ever saw in any country. Mr. Pike is at present making seventy pounds of this kind of butter each week, and will increase the amount as rapidly as the demand requires. People who want good butter can get it of Mr. Pike.

**S. S. MAYDAY PICNIC.**—We are requested to state that those intending to go to the Sunday School Picnic on next Saturday should be at Hackleman's grove by ten o'clock A. M. At that hour a short address will be delivered for the benefit of the children, after which they will be at liberty to choose their own mode of passing the time. Mr. Fox, it is understood, will take the swing out to the grove for the amusement of the little ones. It is expected that those who want refreshments will bring them—come provided to "eat themselves!" Should the weather prove favorable, a happy time may be expected for the young folks.

**FROST.**—Evidences of a big white frost could be observed everywhere on Thursday morning. Ice was formed four inches (not up endwise) in length, Wednesday night.

**STRAWBERRIES.**—No fresh strawberries have made their appearance in our market as yet.

**FIRE ENGINE.**—Our new fire engine hasn't arrived. When it does we'll chronicle the fact.

**HAIL STORM.**—A heavy hail storm descended in this vicinity on Wednesday evening.

**NEW AGENT.**—Mr. William Thurman is the new resident telegraphist in this burg. He is a good operator besides being a genial fellow.

**COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.**—Council met Thursday evening, April 22d. Present—Mayor Standard; Councilmen Cundiff, Mealey Comley and Hackleman. Minutes of previous meeting read and approved. Messrs. Abbott & Brown presented bill of \$18 75, for city printing for the quarter ending March 31st, 1869, which was allowed.

A petition was received signed by A. Fox and Frank Parton, asking the Council to order the graving of Third street between Calapooia and Vine streets, similar to Second street, and that the stumps be removed. The petition was granted, the property-holders ordered to remove the stumps, and that the graving be done by the 20th of June next.

Ordered that the Marshal fill all the streets, where they cross Second, that may be necessary, according to the best of his judgment, and that the same be done as cheap as possible.

On motion, a committee of three were appointed, Comley, Mealey and Hackleman, to ascertain the best mode of draining the water from Ferry street, between Second and Third streets.

Ordered that the Recorder give notice to receive bids at the next meeting of the Council for graving the crossings on Second street.

A committee of three, Hackleman, Comley and Mealey, was appointed to procure the legal advice of a competent lawyer in regard to assessing and taxing the city property.

Council adjourned to meet on Friday (last night) evening, at 7 o'clock.
